When we have limited your work by our own stubborn resistance, Giver of life: **Forgive us**


We pause in confession to bring you the things we need to lay down,

In abundance and challenge God is present

Often we are confounded and yet pleasantly surprised by the way in which the readings of the day resonate with the way the world is moving around us. I suspect this is reflected in our openness and attention to listening for what God may be revealing in that moment. Of course, then, it is no coincidence that when we open the gospel of John this week, it was a story of God's provision, power, presence and peace.

In John 6:1-21, we see one of Jesus' most recognisable miracles – feeding five thousand people, One of only a couple of scripture stories to appear in all four of the gospel books. What interests me about this reading is the approach John takes

to this reading, the things that are of importance to make known in the writings.

Matthew's gospel draws our attention to giving detail to the number of people who were gathered noting that it was about five thousand men besides women and children. For Mark, the emphasis is on the vividness of the setting and the gathered crowds while Luke's gospel places the emphasis on the disciples' interactions, participation and response throughout the event.

For John, however, the heart of the reading is to reflect the miraculous nature of God's provision through the way Jesus gathered, blessed and distributed the loaves and fish, enough so that everyone was satisfied and there was an abundance left over.

There was a perceived impossibility about whether the ask was indeed something achievable. It could have been so very easy to decide that it was too difficult a task to feed everyone and that it wasn't the business of Jesus and the disciples to feed the multitudes gathered leaving each person to fend for themselves and yet as we read on we see quite clearly that what is thought to be impossible is more than possible, God's providence is clear and abundantly present. We can get sidetracked by trying to appease our own wondering in the "how" of this miracle that we miss grasping the intent of the story. What we do see is that God is present in Jesus and provides with abundance that which is needed. It is important to note that God's providence may not always be in the obvious form as we read here of fish and loaves enough for all but God is nonetheless present in all things. It shouldn't come as a surprise then as we approach the end of the reading we see Jesus meeting the needs of the disciples again, only this time it is in the way he provides a calm and peaceful approach amidst their distress as the seas become rough and the wind picks up. When Jesus walks across the water to them calling out to them not to be afraid their fear immediately is eased and they want to draw Jesus in nearer to them, we don't read that Jesus got into the boat with them, we do read, that the boat reached its destination and the

story picks up the next day with Jesus proclaiming about God's provision in the bread which comes down from heaven. God through Jesus provides for the needs of gathered crowds and the disciples in physical and tangible ways. The quiet, gentle and peaceful presence of God's power and provision for all, enough to ground them and sustain them so their journey may continue.

As a whole church we find ourselves on the cusp of new visions and all that goes with it. The 17th assembly met recently and at the heart of the Church's meeting were Threads of Love, a theme that will enable us to weave the most amazing tapestry if we are willing to be guided by God's provision for us in the coming months and years. There are many threads to be woven, unwoven, untangled and perhaps even cut off, sewn in or patched over. It can be tempting to lean into feeling like the disciples in the boat, scared of all that is going on around us, feeling out of control, ungrounded and lost. Or like the disciples in the gathered crowd when the need for food became apparent and there was little to be found. If we lift our gaze just a little higher and look around, we too will see Jesus moving towards us, the gentle reminder of a generous God who provides all that is needed when we simply ask the question "How can we feed all these people?".
