Christ the King

The claim of disciples of Christ is that they are subject to/dedicated followers of Christ alone, (and an acceptance of the doctrine of the Trinity). If you are a Christian reading or hearing this reflection, please take a moment to meditate on the implications of this. Christian discipleship is not a social form of acceptance, or a participation in aggrandising religious rituals, but rather a complete and utter commitment to the way of the cross.

It is almost certain that when we become followers of Christ, we will develop our own images and concepts of power around the one we follow. Most often we find it in the fervent desire for the return of Christ so that our enemies will be brought to their knees and the righteous King will lay low anybody who does not believe what we believe. I've come to the position that in the end we have to just concede that our desire for a powerful ally to prove us right will always be a feature of our own human nature. I figure that we need to accept this, and then try to mitigate against creating Christ into our own powerful ally, trophy or idol as far as possible.

Christ the King is the last Sunday in the liturgical year and is accompanied by a solemnity and pageantry around the one we claim to be the sovereign over the whole of creation. This is a big deal, and it is such an important part of our understanding of the nature of Christ. However, the irony is that "Christ the King" should always be a paradoxical phrase to us. Rather, we should see that the pageantry is only useful as a contrast to the humility of the crucified Christ and vice versa!

The readings of today hold these paradoxical understandings in front of us and ask us to sit in the mystery of it all. Warning! As soon as you find yourself in a place where you are confident you can make sense of it, take your confidence as a sign to go back and let God speak to you in new ways about the nature of Christ. The readings from today might help us to do this.

Firstly, we have the prophetic witness of Jeremiah. Against the multitude of cautions from God that Israel does not need a King, here is the revered prophet saying that a King will appear, and the people will be saved. He claims that the King will be a descendent of David and the marks of that King shall be the prospering of the community under a wise, righteous and just sovereign. We cannot seem to help ourselves. We love the idea of a kingly leader who will shepherd us into prosperity. Christianity picked up this prophecy and claimed Jesus Christ was the fulfilment of the scripture.

Secondly, we have the reading from Colossians where the claim is made that Christ is the image of the invisible God, who participates in the whole of creation, holds all things together and reconciles all things. The nature of the Cosmic Christ described here is beyond our understanding because of the breadth and power contained in such statements. This is the moment where we should gasp in reverence and awe. Where the pageantry for Christ the King makes sense.

But immediately Paul introduces us to the heart of the paradox. For here is a representation of the mighty, who despite all things associated with our ideas of kingly power was humbled on the cross. This cosmic power has at its very heart, not a story of accorded power and deference, but of deep and true connection across all eternity in a manner that transcends life and death. This is the hope that is at the heart of the Christian gospel. All things are part of God through Christ.

And this is why the readings continue today with Luke's story of the crucifixion. Christ's power is not defined by strength, might and defeat of our enemies. Christ's power is not defined by imperial tendencies to overcome anyone who disagrees with us. Christ's power is not defined by regal trappings of institutional power. Rather here is the story of the wisdom of the one who speaks to the crucified criminal next to him and says: I am with you.

So, as we today sit in a place where we may be overcome by awe at the graciousness and spaciousness of Christ the King, we fall at the foot of the cross knowing that we are disciples only because Christ is with us. Our response should be the fervent prayer that we might hold this wisdom for all others. Amen.
