If we do this, we can be assured that our sins are forgiven. And, for this we say:


Thanks be to God! Amen.

## Reflecting

Luke's gospel makes sure we know that the good news of Christ's birth is true. It does this by starting the story firmly with a when and where, historical and geographical information. The decree had gone out for a census by Caesar Augustus, and so Joseph travels with his pregnant bride to Bethlehem, the city of David. There Mary is to have her child, which will also fulfil the prophecies of the Old Testament for the Messiah's heritage and place of birth. The scene is set.

Unfortunately, the little family cannot find a place to stay and eventually shelter at the back of an inn where the animals are kept, and a manger provides the bed for the baby. This is a story of contrasts. We begin with the emperor, Caesar Augustus who is safe in his palace, a place of wealth and power but the Messiah is born, sheltering where the animals were kept, a humble place. This king, the one who is to save the people does not need the pomp and ceremony of earthly power; God's message is different.

In that region, there were shepherds living in the fields (v8). An ordinary night, some shepherds doing their job. Yet David was a shepherd and God is the shepherd to God's flock, so not inappropriate people to hear the message. The shepherds were terrified by the arrival of the angel and a great light, the glory of the Lord. They are reassured - Do not be afraid - and told the Good News. Again the contrast - great fear to excitement, the shepherds head off, in haste, believing that this is God's word to them and they want to know more, and to see the baby who is the Saviour. Heaven and earth meet, not in a palace, a place of comfort but in a field and a comfortless room.

God does not need magnificent buildings or people with great talents. The message comes in all sorts of places to those who are ready to hear and willing to go and find out more. The shepherds could have run away, ignored what happened, scoffed and said "what can a baby do?" But they didn't; they found Mary and Joseph and the baby, in a town overflowing

with people come for the census, and then shared what they had learnt about the child. They believed this surprising, unbelievable story and were so excited they had to tell others - and their telling must have been convincing because others were amazed. We hear the story year after year. May this be the year that we are amazed and share the story so others are amazed.

The shepherds returned glorifying and praising God.

Mary treasures all the words and ponders them in her heart. An angel gave Mary the good news of the baby, Elizabeth affirmed the good news of who the child was, and now the shepherds. Those in power don't recognise the good news; it is not what they want to hear, nor do many in the world as it contrasts with good news of economic success, power and riches. The good news is the coming of The Messiah, a servant king who brings comfort to those who need it, a story of love and service that turns worldly expectations upside down. Treasure the good news in your heart, go glorifying and praising God and share what you have heard.



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# Responding: Prayers for the World and Community

O God, on this Holy Night we pray for our world.

For those who dread this time of the year, when family members who don't normally mix and who don't get on, come together in tenseness and a lack of love.

May the God of grace bless those for whom Christmas brings bad or unwelcome memories. Heal and transform these days and moments, that they may come to know that you have the last word on all that is ugly. In you, this night, new life is born.

Loving God, be with us all as the Christ Child we need this Christmas. We pray for ourselves and our families and friends. Inspire us to know anew the wonder of your coming to us, O Emmanuel.
