Prayer

The words in Psalm 36: 5-10 celebrate the love of God in all places with abundant feasting and safe sheltering. And so we pray together:

*Your steadfast love, O LORD, extends to the heavens,
your faithfulness to the clouds.*

Your righteousness is like the mighty mountains.

*Your judgments are like the great deep;
you save humans and animals alike, O LORD.*

How precious is your steadfast love, O God! All people may take refuge in the shadow of your wings.

They feast on the abundance of your house, and you give them drink from the river of your delights.

For with you is the fountain of life; in your light we see light.

*O continue your steadfast love to those who know you,
and your salvation to the upright of heart!*

We pause for a moment to silently recall the extravagance of blessing that we experience in the presence of God around and within us.

(pause)

However we know that we are not pure and blameless, that we often take a wrong turn, make a bad choice and let our shadow side dictate our thoughts and actions.

Psalm 36 begins:

Transgression speaks to the wicked, deep in their hearts; there is no fear of God before their eyes.

For they flatter themselves in their own eyes that their iniquity cannot be found out and hated.

The words of their mouths are mischief and deceit; they have ceased to act wisely and do good.

They plot mischief while on their beds; they are set on a way that is not good; they do not reject evil.

Help us again, forgiving God to reject evil, to watch our words, to look for the wise and generous path, walking in your light.

Help us to cultivate holy fear, trembling in the face of your abundant goodness and to celebrate the blessings you bring to us, day and night.

We pause for a moment to bring you those burdens of fear, guilt and regret that we would rather not carry, and ask you to do as you promise, to lighten our lives with your love.

(pause)

in the name of Jesus, **Amen**

Reflecting Marian Bissett

The psalmist calls out to God and lists the wrongdoings of the wicked and those who follow the wrong path. We then read of the radical and generous love of God, the faithful one; *"Your righteousness is like the eternal mountains, your judgements are like the mighty deep; you save humankind and animalkind alike, Faithful One. How precious is your faithful love, O God! All the woman-born take shelter in the shadow of your wings"* (Ps. 36:6-7)^[1].

Some say it was a sign and others a miracle, but the beginning of Jesus' ministry was at a wedding. It did not happen in the big city, or with the rich and famous or even with the Rabbis in the synagogue. The Son of Woman listened to his mother and performed a sign. The gospel of John does not have a communion event as the other gospels do, nevertheless this act at the wedding is eucharistic as Jesus points out the direction his life was to take, to be eucharistic for those who believe.

It is Mary who holds my interest as much as the sign Jesus performed. There is no mention of Joseph now; has he disappeared, or did he have to start work again? Perhaps this is an important omission the writer of the gospel made. Mary who gave birth to the Son of God, would then be the one to start the ministry of Jesus, Son of Woman.

I wonder whether Jesus had ever sat with his mother in the middle of the night and questioned his calling, whether he really did want to leave the security of home and set out on his ministry life knowing where it would end, whether he even wanted to be at the wedding. Did Mary know, as Jesus did, of the faithful and generous love of God and the necessity to perform the action and fill the containers with wine? I wonder...

Mary responded to these wonderings simply and expected her son to act appropriately. "They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he

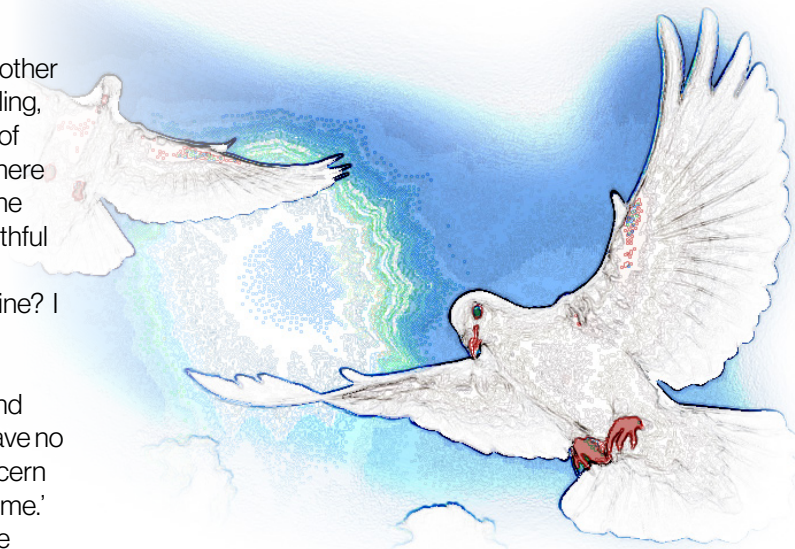
tells you'" (Jn. 2:3-5, NRSV). She didn't tell him what to do, but she didn't ask him either. She gave him the 'mother look' and he acted. Mary spoke to the staff as well and perhaps there was something in the maternal voice which meant the staff also listened to her. The 'mother look' and the strength Mary showed at the start of Jesus' ministry was the strength she showed at the end of Jesus' ministry when she held him in her arms.

The location of the wedding remains important to be reminded of in our contemporary landscape. When we hear of the church no longer holding a central place in societies, this is to be applauded. For it is then we may be more able to hear the calling of God to be amongst those who do not hold wealth or privilege, or for whom institutional religion may hold traumatic memories. Wherever we are located, whatever our life may look like, let us never forget the radical and generous love of God, described in a simple comment by Mary and performed by the Son of Woman, Son of God.

2022 has begun or rather time has merged from 2021 and we all want this year to bring renewed energy and hopes. Let us never forget God "who is the fountain of life [and in whose] light we see light" (Ps. 36:9).^[2]

and taught us to pray saying:**

hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come, your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.

Forgive us our sins,
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory
are yours now and for ever. Amen.**

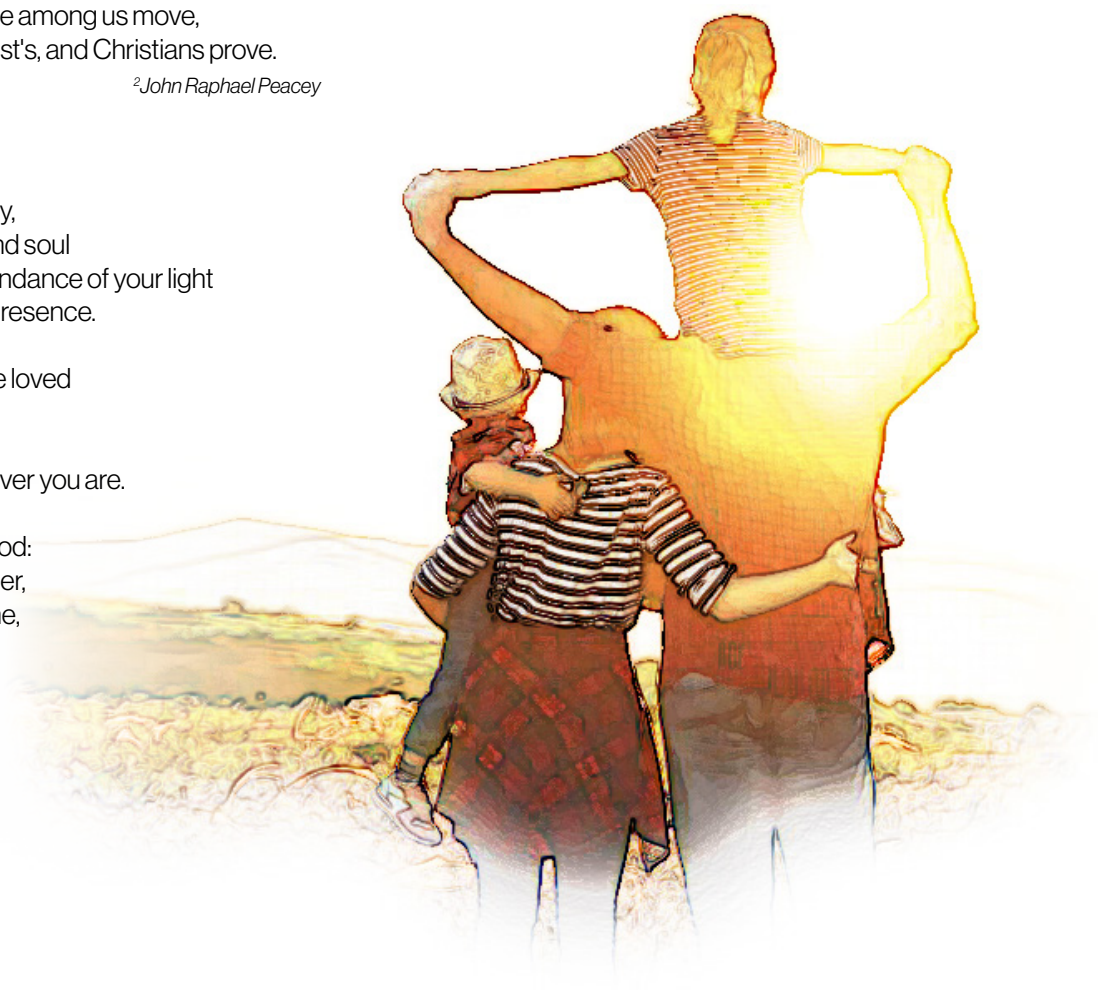
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
