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## Listening

**Read:** Psalm 37: 1-11, 39-40

## Prayer

Psalm 37 invites us to trust in God,

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## Reflecting

Oh, what a rich and wonderful set of readings the lectionary takes us through this week. Can you feel the vibe? If you wondered about the subversive and counter cultural claims regarding following Jesus, here is that reversal stuff in technicolour. Joseph radically forgives his brothers for the terrible treatment he has received at their hands. In fact, he asks them to move in!

The Psalm (CEB version) asks us to “live in the land and farm faithfulness”, to “let go of anger” and rage and even fretting. In this we find a “surplus of peace”!! Don’t get upset, because it may lead to evil. The 1 Corinthians passage acts as a caution to be focused on the nature of heavenly principles rather than earthly perspectives. Things as we know them will die and be resurrected in newness and revitalization. The shape of emergence and growth is in God’s hands.

Luke is a radical turning on its head of everything we tend towards! Firstly, we must listen. Oh dear, that is hard to do in itself. Our way of living is geared toward being busy and distracted, not listening. We are asked to do the opposite of our own inclination and repay poor treatment for good. Even violence is to be met with peaceful response. We are to love and forgive our neighbour. OK so my neighbours aren’t too bad. But I am also asked to love and forgive my enemies. Oh, that is much harder, and from my point of view, it’s easier to preach it than to live it. This is not the sort of love of popular culture and love songs. It is deep and abiding and tough love. It is a different kindness that prevails in the face of the unkindness of another. This forgiveness is not skin deep but a truly subversive heart forgiveness in grace and mercy and compassion. It even calls us to forgive ourselves in grace and mercy because (as my dad used to say) we can “be our own greatest enemy” at times.

There are many quotes on forgiveness, some making it a ‘divine’ value and others see it as a form of revenge. Some mention the importance of forgiveness to achieve healing. Some refer to

whether or not the other person is contrite and repentant.

A word of caution here because there is a much deeper conversation and sensitivity around some of the truly evil things which have been (and are) done to people, and I hear the struggle to forgive and come to terms with such pain. This passage does not endorse the people subjecting others to ongoing abuse and oppression. Archbishop Desmond Tutu defined forgiveness as “*the capacity to make a new start. Forgiveness is the grace by which we enable the other person to get up, and get up with dignity, to begin anew. In the act of forgiveness, we are declaring our faith in the future of a relationship and in the capacity of the wrongdoer to change.*” But he also believed that this is not the same as denial or forgetting, and I would perhaps add excusing. Deeds which harm others need to be owned up to and dealt with.

It seems certain that to truly love, we need to forgive. I think this radical passage in Luke calls us to forgive in the measure we have been forgiven, freely, radically, totally, generously and mercifully. God is kind to the ungrateful and wicked, and is merciful to all.

Forgiveness is revolutionary. Love is revolutionary. Kindness is revolutionary. May we live out this revolution.





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## Responding: Prayers for the World and Community

Today is the World Day of Social Justice and this is reflected in our prayer. You might want to have some candles ready to light for particular prayer points.

God whose love extends beyond our imagining

where there is apathy, bring compassion  
where there is hatred, bring love.**

In our communities, in our neighbourhoods, in our families, there are so many people living from day to day in situations of poverty, abuse, illness and despair. We bring our prayers for our communities and families to you:

*You might want to light candles for particular peoples or places...*

**Where there is brokenness bring restoration  
where there is hurt, bring healing  
where there is despair, bring hope  
where there is confusion, bring understanding  
where there is hatred, bring love.**

Within each of us there are aspects of our lives that long to be made whole; mental and physical health, spiritual restoration, relationship healing, confidence in capacity and identity, overcoming fear, embracing change, growing in love ... We bring our prayers for ourselves to you:

*You might want to light candles for particular aspects of your life...*

**Come to us, Spirit of life,  
restore us and make us whole  
so that we can be bearers of light  
and move amidst the darkness  
with abundant love and blessing,  
as we say together:**
