Reflecting

This passage in Luke's gospel begins with immediacy, at that very hour, and ends with eternity. We are shown the determination of Jesus to continue the course of his work and to not be tempted away from the journey to the cross. We are invited to dwell under the wings of a loving mother-hen God, if only we can repent and accept the invitation.

There's a particular domestic experience that divides our UCA Synod of Vic/Tas, and it is present in the gospel reading this week. It is something that Victorians know about and may well have experienced, and our Tasmanian siblings hopefully never will: A fox threatening the henhouse, a predator on the prowl.

The Pharisees have come to warn Jesus. Maybe out of kindness, or maybe this could be interpreted as a return of the tempter from the wilderness, trying to turn Jesus from his mission, from the cross. "Tell that fox...," says Jesus and those of us from the mainland shudder, "Tell that fox that I'm going to keep going,



today and tomorrow, to continue to love and not to hide, and on the third day, I will finish my work." This third day points to the resurrection, but I wonder if, first, it points to the cross. Is it at the cross that Jesus' work is complete? On Good Friday we will hear these words from John's gospel; 'it is finished'.

Currently the world is in turmoil, experiencing what might be described as a predator on the prowl. We watch in horror as war escalates and wonder if we have learned anything in the last 80 years. As Ukraine gathers her men-chicks to defend, exiles coming home to fight, she shelters her most vulnerable as best she can under her wings, some fleeing to neighbouring places of sanctuary. Meanwhile Russia destroys the life, livelihoods, and land that it most wants to control and inhabit. God have mercy.

We have not been willing to learn, to repent, to be gathered as one humanity.

Jesus says to the Pharisees, "See, your house is left to you." Pyrrhic victory. They kill the one who is the living house of God, to protect the house. As Will Willimon, contemporary theologian notes: "Their house is the temple, this great solid rock that represented Israel's relationship to Yahweh... Here is a warning to any who take security in the solidity of religious membership, institutions, and traditions." The hearers of Luke's gospel know about the fall of the temple.

Jesus, moving towards his own fate, is concerned for ours. Here is the good news! There is time to turn around, and this is Lent, 'a time for turning and turning until we come 'round right.' This maternal image of God as mother-hen doesn't get much airplay, we seem to be more drawn to the image of the lamb, or the lion for Jesus, rather than the chook. Is it because we struggle to imagine God as mother? Oh ..., so many struggles.

May this time of struggle, this wilderness of bewilderment, this Lenten journey, be a place of transformation for you. May you find the courage to submit to sheltering under the wings of God, turning from those things that cause destruction and distraction, knowing you are loved and forgiven. May it be so for you, for me, for all God's creatures, today, tomorrow and for all eternity. Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.


