I was quite startled by my response to the words of the Apostle Paul in Romans. While talk of suffering producing endurance and endurance producing character is familiar enough, the circumstances of the world have shifted vastly in recent times. Suffering runs deep in numerous ways both locally and globally. But in the context of more than two years of pandemic - with associated lockdowns, isolation, grief, and polarizing attitudes - does suffering produce endurance and character?

I had imagined that as Australia emerged from lockdowns our health and wellbeing would improve. Reunions of family and friends, renewed freedoms and being able to make plans without constantly pivoting would surely be a good thing. While much of that is true, it seems that suffering continues but in different forms.

Many are struggling to be part of community again. COVID 19 is more prevalent than at any time throughout the pandemic, and despite the protection of vaccinations, many feel extremely vulnerable. Families and friends have fractured over the divide of those who are and are not vaccinated, and the distress seems to deepen rather than heal.

Have we reached the end of our endurance? I see many places where character has diminished – that is if character refers to grace, compassion, and respect for our fellow people.

One of the challenges is the way truth is understood. Truth has always been contested but perhaps this is now more than ever. 'Fake news' has become a common phrase to undermine the integrity of another opinion. It is easy to go looking for opinions that support our own biases and therefore

strengthen resolve against another paradigm. Be it online or in physical groupings, when we find our tribe of like-minded people sharing the one truth, it polarizes and fractures our world. This has happened in troubling ways through the pandemic.

We recently spent a week in Mallacoota offering ministry support. We camped at the caravan park which means meeting people from all walks of life. One night we chatted around the fire with some new friends from Sydney and once we moved on from our shared interest in campervans, we discovered how different we were. One of our new friends talked about 'truth' that was so far from my understanding I couldn't see truth there at all ...

From the gospel of John, Jesus is preparing the disciples for life beyond him. He says to them that the Spirit of truth will guide them in truth, as part of God's plan or glory. So 'what is truth?'

Perhaps some truths might include: If we cannot find ways to resolve the COVID vaccination divide, things will get more fractious; if we find safety in a close-knit tribe and dismiss difference, divisions will deepen; if we are so worn out as to lose hope, we are less likely to find love and grace towards our neighbour ... *(you may wish to add your own thoughts here).*

Last week the church celebrated Pentecost. In today's passage from John, Jesus talks of the Holy Spirit as truth, to guide us into all truth. Jesus says the Spirit 'will not speak on his own'. It is not the opinion of the Spirit that is truth. It is the discernment and listening of the Spirit in relationship that guides us into truth. As we consider the deep mystery of our triune God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit; Creator, Redeemer, Sustainer – we are invited into the mystery of God as community. They (one in three / three in one) are the glory of God. It is together that truth is revealed.

Whatever truths I may hold, I can never fully understand all things. Our triune God invites us to consider the strength of diversity. It is in encountering different gifts, skills and perceptions that we are brought to wisdom and truth. That calls me to be open to the different 'tribes' that are beyond the church, and to those within it. As we listen for the

voice of the Spirit, hope comes. We shall be as one, as they are one.
