breathe into our gathering, into our open hearts and minds with the renewal of your presence.


Come Word of life.

Reflecting

I am going to avoid verse 33 of the gospel reading because, ouch! I really think it means literally what it says and I have so much stuff. Perhaps if I sold it I could finance a whole country of hungry people. Let's start instead with the imagery of the Psalm.

God speaks and summons the earth from the rising of the sun to its setting. The opening word from Psalm 50 is quite an image. All day from sunrise to sunset. God shines forth and gathers the faithful ones. What does faithfulness to God look like? It is not about sacrifice and fulfilling our dutiful measures of worship, but rather it is about faithfulness in seeking justice, doing good, freeing the oppressed and advocating for the marginalised (imaged here as widows and orphans). Eating the good of the land can only happen when we all get to eat of it together.

In our current time of deepening poverty and grim economic forecasts, living in the shadow of a world in turmoil and still in the grips of a pandemic, we are yet called to faithfully serve. We are only whole as a society when all people are being helped to wholeness. Here is the way to build up your treasures, for where your treasure is, there also is your heart.

I recently read an old 'wisdom story' about daybreak. A rabbi asked the students in his class about what signifies the end of night and the beginning of day. He asked if it is when one type of tree can be differentiated from another. Or when one animal can be seen distinctly from another. No, the way to tell when the morning has come is when you can look at the face of another person and see that they are your sisters and brothers. Up until then it is always night because the light has not yet come. This is where our heart and our treasure needs to be, in recognising the Christ in one another.

The reality of our time is that people are becoming homeless and hungry at a huge rate of knots and every one of us is never far from this as a possibility. What does our love of Christ ask of us? The gospel message this week suggests that we be ready at any time, that we remain on alert. The time to reach out in love is right now.

But sending some stuff to the op shop or a one-off sacrifice of some desired possession is not what we are being asked to consider here. While we are bound up in our 'stuff', we are honouring the wrong things. Our lives and our lifestyles need to reflect care for the planet and for one another. This is a whole different kind of economy. It is part of our advocacy for the marginalised. Until we are all free from oppression then none of us is truly free.

We are encouraged in Hebrews to aim for the promises even if we don't personally feel the effect of them. We are to face forward in faith, to take courage to make the decisions and not look backwards to what was.

"May your choices reflect your hopes, not your fears." This quote by Nelson Mandela holds such wisdom for us. We hope that the world can be different. We know that there is enough love, enough food, enough shelter, for all people. All we need to do is set our sights on sharing it. This is our treasure and right here is our faithful service.

So today when God summons us all day, how will God shine forth through you?


