Listening

Read: From Jeremiah 31

31:27 The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will sow the house of Israel and the house of Judah with the seed of humans and the seed of animals.

31:28 **And just as I have watched over them to pluck up and break down, to overthrow, destroy, and bring evil, so I will watch over them to build and to plant, says the LORD.**

31:29 In those days they shall no longer say: "The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge."

31:30 **But all shall die for their own sins; the teeth of everyone who eats sour grapes shall be set on edge.**

31:31 The days are surely coming, says the LORD, **when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah.**

31:32 It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—**a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD.**

31:33 But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: **I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people.**

Reflecting:

The very idea of a judge who has no fear of God and no real concern for people is quite a worrying one. His only motivation is not to be bothered any further by the woman. I am sure that there really are such judges in the world, though I am equally sure that judges who are caring, considerate and just are the norm.

This story tells me that the Gospels do not shirk away from the realities in the world. There are unjust judges, just as there are women who plead for justice, sometimes for themselves, sometimes for their people and sometimes as advocates for those others experiencing injustice. In the times when the gospels were set and the times that there were written, there were people in great suffering from injustice just as there are now. This was a community who were oppressed by the occupation of their lands, and the judicial authorities as well as the religious authorities were very conscious of playing things in a way which would not "rock the boat" and would appease the occupiers.

So I hear this story through the lens of just such injustice today, through the pain of the 'disappeared' ones, through the mothers who cry "How long, O God?!". I hear it through the unjust incarceration

rates of indigenous people and of those seeking refuge on our shores. How often do they plead to unjust, uncaring or disrespectful judges and authority figures like this one? It makes me lend my voice to theirs in seeking justice, in crying to God for justice. Perhaps that is what the final verse alludes to, what this faith on earth really looks like. And so we pray and do not lose heart. 2 Timothy asks us to hold steady, to relax into the faith and stand firm. We are to trust in the truth who is Jesus and live life firmly from the teaching in which we are grounded. We are to love wholeheartedly and to rely on the Judge who is truly just. We are to align ourselves with these values and teachings.

The Old Testament readings are full of tasting and sensuality. There is the 'teeth on edge' sour of the grapes and then the dripping sweetness of the wild honey. Both of these passages centre on us being responsible in the end for our own decisions and actions. We are invited personally into covenant relationship which holds us and keeps us close to God and to the teachings which hold us firm. When we step out of this into the sour taste of dissonance we are called back into the sweetness of the relationship. This is why we pray and keep ourselves centred, to not lose heart. This is why we call to the One who is Justice and Truth and persevere in prayer knowing we are loved.
