As we begin the season of Lent we remember - Christ is our light.


#### **Acknowledging**

## Reflecting

#### **Rev. Gospel Ralte**

In Genesis we hear of God forming man from the dust of the ground and breathing him into life. We hear from there of the man and woman living in the garden under God's care. They (and we) have free will - the ability to choose. What we decide at any moment isn't forced upon us. This is the uniqueness of relationship God has designed to exercise within the universe.

As part of this order, God commands the man in the garden, "You shall not eat of this,... otherwise you will surely die." Eating of all trees are permitted except one. This command comes in love. These are not the words of a dictator, rather one of relationship and place – how people are to live in God's created order. With relationship and free will comes responsibility and consequence. The man and woman know that to defy God has great consequences. But they still have choice to decide what to do.

The serpent knows what God has commanded and finds the man and woman. Didn't God know about the snake? Of course, God knew it. But God has not blocked or eradicated free will, whether it be used for good or evil.

The scene is set for a battle of will and obedience; a battle of good against evil; a battle of which voice to listen to. Free human will is neither under the control of God or the serpent. The man and woman are taken in by the snake. What the serpent says seems to make sense of what God has commanded. The serpent plays God off against the man and woman, and they cannot resist the promise to be godlike themselves. They cannot

resist the promise of power. Surely knowledge of good and evil is a good thing!

Evil triumphs over good. The covenant between God and humans is broken. The relationship of trust is broken and cannot be restored. The man and woman will find themselves expelled from the garden, once what they have done is brought to the light.

The apostle Paul (in the book of Romans) speaks of these things as a history. Sin is like a curse, an inherited stain upon all of humanity. When Adam and Eve fell into temptation, all of us did. We cannot escape what they could not escape. Everyone on earth is born with that unwanted but unavoidable consequence "you will surely die"; being dead in relationship with God, the Creator.

As such, we have failed God and our fellow human beings and other creations in many and various ways. The apostle speaks of the price of this, one that needs to be paid for. We don't have the power in our own strength of heart to be in relationship with God as is described before the fall. We cannot save ourselves from falling into temptation. It is as though the serpent continues to appeal to our pride and ego and tempt us beyond our capacity to live.

However, God's love and concern always follow, look after, and guide us. After the fall a battle was declared, with nothing less at stake than human redemption (Gen 3:15). The battle lines have been drawn.

In the Old Testament, God makes a new covenant with the people; when that is broken God tries again and again and again. A final covenant is needed, one that will restore our relationship with God and free us from sin.

God's only Son comes to us in Godly obedience, to live our life and die our death in order that we may live. It is a free gift, one that releases us from the power of sin. The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world shows mercy on us.

# **Blessing**


As Jesus finds temptation in the wilderness, he also shows us how to listen to the voice of God.


Through the psalmist God says (Ps 32): I will instruct you and teach you the way you should go; I will counsel you with my eye upon you.


Siblings in Christ,

Matthew 4:1 Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil.


What does it mean to be led 'up/into' the wilderness, to enter it fully and be embraced by it, immersed, in relationship with it?

What is this wilderness of Lent that we have entered? Is it a hot, dry, red dust place with hidden watercourses, cracked earth and crisp, clear nights? Or is it green and lush, filled with untamed sounds and smells of life where locusts and wild honey are in abundant supply? Or is it something else?

Time to unleash your inner artist! Find paper or your journal and go wild! Using pencils/paints/pastels/chalk; draw, scribble, doodle - whatever comes to you.
