## Reflecting

#### **Rev. Jennie Gordon**

The first thing I noticed was that she carried a particularly unpleasant odour. Her dirty clothes hung from a thin body, wild hair framed a sullen face and she moved slowly, physically exhausted, spent. It wasn't unexpected to encounter someone in this condition at a relief centre during a devastating bushfire. As chaplain, I made my way towards her. Sitting down, waiting, I offered her water, food, a cup of coffee ... she said she was fine. She didn't look fine. Thinking that she had made her way in from some remote hermit hideaway with a hundred cats, I asked what her day had been like. Crazy, she said, I'm the local yet.

How often do we reduce people to a single, simple story that we make up about them, often related to their appearance? We hold on to that assumption, description, bias, or judgement, failing to see the person who is before us. Why then, are we surprised, when they have a whole other set of stories to tell us that don't fit into the box that we have put them in?

In today's reading from the book of Samuel, Jesse's son David had been overlooked in the line-up of his brothers. He was, after all, simply the youngest and was busy with looking after the sheep. So why would he be included in an important gathering such as this? On seeing Eliab, Samuel thinks his job is done, after all, he was probably tall, strong and good looking, but the Lord explains to Samuel in verse 7: "Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the LORD does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the LORD looks on the heart."

So, son after son is presented to Samuel, and in the end, they discover that they can't proceed until little David is called in from the fields. Yes, says the Lord to Samuel, anoint him. There's a quirky addition to the story here, that, even after the Lord has said that the Lord doesn't look on outward appearances, the text goes on to tell us that David "was ruddy, and had beautiful eyes, and was handsome." This can be read as a strange kind of affirmation of the assumption that beauty is a blessing given by God to those chosen, which belongs to the dark and dangerous idea that physical impairment is somehow connected to the opposite of blessing. Now there's something to discuss!

We don't even get to know the name of the man in the middle of the story from John's gospel. He is simply known as 'the man born blind' or 'the man who was blind.' No wonder his neighbours couldn't recognise him after he was given sight if he was only ever identified or known by his incapacity. When his fear-filled parents are asked by the Pharisees, "Is this your son?" They respond with, "It looks like our son who was born blind. We don't know any more than that. Ask him." Without the blindness that he was known by, his whole identity is in question.

This rich and layered story is all about sin and suffering and punishment and prophets, and a refusal or inability from the religious leaders to see Jesus for who he is. The one who sees him is the one who was born blind. We don't often sit well with things we don't understand. When a situation strays out of our known and constructed worldview, we get fearful and try to explain it away. Theologian Will Willimon says of this story, that 'some new and uncontained power is loose here.' That can be a frightening thing.

People are always more than their appearance and more complex than the simple stories we construct about them. The God who is revealed to us in Jesus is always more than we can ever contain, know or understand. Our task as followers is to

be courageous, inviting the Light of the World to shine into our darkness, even and especially when we encounter something that challenges the way we see ourselves, each other and our tightly held constructions of church, faith and life.

All I know is, he said, that once I was blind and and now I see.



Is there someone close to you who could be a future leader for the sake of the world? What can you do to include them in the conversation?


### **Wednesday March 22**
