The 'Gospel' according to Matthew. The writer of this Gospel wants to share good news. And the good news is about Jesus the Messiah, the son of David. the son of Abraham.

Each of the writers of the gospels has a unique picture of who Jesus is. The stories they choose to tell, and how they tell the stories give us clues as to what the writer thinks is the important thing for us to know about Jesus. Each Gospel is like a collage of stories of Jesus' life arranged around the writer's central theme.

For Matthew, Jesus is the Messiah, the promised King of David's line. Jesus is the new Moses, the promised prophet from Deuteronomy 18:15. And Jesus is *Immanuel 'God with us.'* The central theme in this gospel is that the promises of God have come to fulfilment in Jesus.

Jesus' ministry begins with the announcement that God's kingdom has come into the world. John draws a huge crowd calling out the hypocrisy of people's lives and challenging them to prepare for the coming king. Jesus announces the kingdom and calls people to follow him. Jesus and the disciples travel throughout Galilee, proclaiming this good news that God's kingdom is here.

Those who come are the sick, the ones suffering, the ones cast out and on the fringes of the community. Society's losers, fakers, and troublemakers. The riff-raff and the toxic, the kids, the dependent, the isolated, the lonely. He was the King of the ones nobody wanted, and they loved him. They followed him, they learned from him, they became his family.

These people love Jesus because he speaks their language. He understands their lives. He doesn't judge them, he is one of them. They know he cares. They know he is who he says he is, and they trust him. Jesus gives them a voice. He gives their lives and experiences a voice. He gives their pain a voice. And he stands up for them before leaders, no matter their power and influence.

The ones who were the movers and shakers, the king makers, those with too much to lose, well for them, he just wasn't good news. What he said just didn't make sense, in fact it was blasphemous. He was dangerous, they thought; his life and teaching were scandalous.

And the tension rises and rises as we travel through Matthew's good news.

Reflecting continues

What is greatness? That's a question asked a few times in Matthew's gospel. What does the writer want us to know about greatness? Who are the great ones in our society today? What do the Kings of sport, society, arts, culture, fashion, media look like today? Who and what springs to your mind? What I love about Palm Sunday's gospel reading is that it shows greatness in two worlds at the same time. It shows what different people think greatness is and what God knows true greatness is.

Jesus goes to Jerusalem, God's city. He is riding a donkey (or two depending how you read the verse). Jesus, the voice for the people who are on the fringes of society (the leftovers, the spares, the ones who don't get a say). He is surrounded by his followers calling out praise, laying their garments on the road to make the way smooth for him, waving branches in salute to him.

And where is the very first place Matthew has him go? To the temple. To the place where God was said to reside with God's people. And what does he do? He cleanses it. He drives out those who are corrupting the worship of God. He makes way for the temple to be a "house of prayer". And the blind and the lame come for healing to him there, and the children cry out in praise in the temple. The son is coming home.

The movers and shakers don't like it one bit. But Jesus is the voice for the ones who have no voice. Jesus speaks truth to power all the way through Holy Week. Jesus speaks truth to power right up to today. He has given this mission to his followers. To clear the way to give a voice to the voiceless. To allow those who are pushed aside to come right in and be seen and heard and valued as God's beloved children. Jesus is Immanuel – God with us to the end of the age. This is good news that everyone needs to know (Matthew 28:19-20).

1 Euangelion is the Greek word translated 'gospel' which means 'good news'


We pray for people in our places of power to make wise and compassionate decisions and for ourselves to have the courage to get involved where Jesus on a donkey is needed today.
