Reflecting

It's easy to get caught up in the commercial hype around Easter - hot cross buns, easter eggs. bilbies, the last camping holiday before the winter and so on and at one level I am not sure this is necessarily wrong or right. In a country where religious festivals are increasingly for the few who are already members, it makes sense to utilise a final gasp of summer. Or does it...

This is the opportunity we are given time and time again to be out amongst those who are not inside the physical building. Thomas gives an example of one who needs some proof, some evidence that

are many and in unexpected places. They are the ones who attend the local country picnic race meets, or the folk who go away with a group of friends for a break or they are also the people we forget about so easily; lonely, isolated, unable to leave a house for many reasons.

this is true. The Thomas' of today

One of the interesting requests from Thomas was about touch. Thomas needed to touch the holes. touch the wounds to experience truth. We are all like that as humans; the first experience we had as newborn babies was touch, and it is likely to be the last experience as we die. It defines the truthful emotion in the mind of the giver and therefore to the receiver. Touch became suddenly a thing of danger and fear overnight 3 years ago and how many of us still think twice before we shake hands, hug someone we are close to offer a hand of comfort to someone in distress? Touch bears truth and transparency of emotion and when taken away we are left conflicted, wondering where we fit in.

Thomas is often maligned as being the one without faith, but was he? Was he perhaps unable to process what had been happening. We might call it Post Traumatic Stress Injury in today's lingo. How many times have we been paralysed from fear or trauma of a past event and unable to verbalise that or be able to face the trauma? When we meet people in our day to day lives, we meet those who like Thomas may be paralysed by their own trauma and unable to move in any direction. The face of God invites us to walk with them, do we listen?

Jesus came and appeared to the disciples and greeted them in peace, "peace be with you" and breathed the Holy Spirit onto them. The Spirit was present with the disciples at that point and so they were keen to let Thomas know they had seen Jesus and were filled with the Holy Spirit. I wonder why it was a whole 8 days later before Thomas joined them; we don't know and can only speculate.

The twist at the end of the reading is that the writer shifts focus from narrative to speaking to the reader, then and to us now. Everything is to help us with our unbelief to become belief. It seems so easy, to go to the places we are invited to, filled with the Holy Spirit in the same way as God went out through Jesus.
