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Reflecting

I remember from childhood a preacher labouring over water as an analogy of the Trinity. He spoke of the three states of water-solid, liquid, gas- as like Father-Son-Spirit. One substance in three states. One God in three persons.

I recall it didn't make a lot of sense to me. To think of the Trinity as a riddle to be captured or solved doesn't match how I understand God. I suppose the world is made up of diverse people and part of that gift is that we look, see, think in different ways. Both engineer and artist see and bring different things to the world. The bible is complex and varied in its library of 66 books, taking us on a journey of history, culture, experience and the struggle to know God.

I think I discover God through experience. Every day I look to the heavens as a kind of cosmic compass. I'm aware of sunrise and sunset and changes through the year. I'm aware of the night sky and the way the Southern Cross will always point south if you can follow its map. I love nothing more than getting away from night lights and gazing in awe at the milky part of the Milky Way galaxy. Scripture is also rich with witness to awe and majesty of creation.

I lift up my eyes to the hills-from where will my help come?

My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.

The Bible is rich with insight and blessing because it invites us into the struggles of following God, and the diverse ways in taking that journey. And when it comes to learning from Jesus, it is the closest we get to experiencing the person who lived in the ancient near east two millennia ago. While the gospels chronicle his life fairly closely, his impact and a broader witness to him fill the remainder of the New Testament.

But devout reading or scholarship hardly captures the impact of Jesus on me personally. Last week we celebrated the day of Pentecost. The gospel reading has Jesus saying to his disciples, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit." (John 20)

This is difficult to put language to. But as I am drawn to awe by gazing at the night sky, so I am moved by a sense of breath, power and spirit that makes it seem as though Jesus is directly present with me. I feel as though the risen Christ is breathing peace and offering me the same Holy Spirit.

Perhaps I am more artist than engineer. The formula of water doesn't resonate with me as it does others. But the Orthodox icon of the Trinity by Andrei Rublev draws me into the nature of God like no formula does. It invites us to think about a dynamic relationship that is open to those who seek God. From this comes the word perichoresis which means dancing together. This is fluid, complementary, cooperative and invitational.

Thank God for the diversity of Scripture and the diverse ways in which people continue to follow faithfully the Lord our God who is one but experienced as Trinity. Father-Son-Spirit (note these are descriptions of relationship); Creator-Redeemer-Sustainer; Source-Son-Spirit.
