Reflecting

Jacob recognised the sacredness of 'Place' through his deep encounter with God. He knew that this country was holy land and it held the presence of God in a palpable sense. Interesting that he recognised and heard the Spirit through his dream. Our dreams can certainly be a place where we have deep encounters with the Spirit.

A few years ago I was pondering a major research program I had decided to undertake. However, I was floundering around in my efforts to find clear focus. One night as I went to bed I decided to welcome dreams, to allow my mind to relax and hear what God and my inner self were trying to say to me, to hear my unconscious dreaming. I woke up with three words in my heart and they have held me right through my efforts. Every time I get lost or unfocussed in my project they speak themselves to me again, "Tell the Stories". What are your dreams saying to you?

Have you ever heard the term 'God forsaken'? As a chaplain in schools I often heard people refer to "bringing God into" the school and yet some of my best God encounters were already happening in the school. I could sense the Spirit's work already inviting people, connecting them in their diversity and being there in kindness and the moments when people were at their most human. Students always had such life about them and if I listened carefully, I could hear God in relationship with the sacredness at the centre of people's humanity.

When I was at college, I did a unit called *Sacred* and *Secular* and found it very helpful. In the student lounge we had been having an ongoing

discussion about whether God was everywhere. I sat in some interesting places in that course and could see that the question needs to be flipped. There is nowhere that God is NOT present. Anyway, the project I undertook for this session led me to Rolland House where the Deaconesses from the Presbyterian Church had been trained and in going to visit the building and noting the changes, I was renewed in my own sense of call.

In this land we refer to the Great South Land of the Holy Spirit. When we come in as outsiders and think we 'bring' God with us we do damage to those present as well as to the work of the Spirit. But when we expect to encounter God, to listen for the Spirit as Jacob did (and recognise the encounter when it occurs) we work in tune with God and each other. Let us listen and celebrate when we encounter God and mark these as special moments of connection. There is nowhere that God is NOT present.

Sometimes we walk into a field of ministry and see weeds, other times we see herbs and plants which have been placed there for growth and nourishment. Jesus' teaching here encourages me to let go of the need to sift and discern between them. With wisdom and care I can let them flourish and allow for them to have different purposes when the time of harvest comes. After all, weeds are apparently just plants growing in the wrong place. Dandelion tea may be a tasty medicinal plant used for healing, but it can be annoying when it is growing in my lawn and or among my pot plants. Let's let God sort out the winnowing, deciding what needs to grow where. Rather than labelling weeds and seeds we can let them grow together. Later on, all will be revealed but it is not for us to do the sifting. We hear the groaning of creation, the longing of all that has been created, for the Spirit's touch. We await with eager hope, the fulfilment of all things and the reconciliation of all of us to God, to each other and to nature.
