Authority

I think we have all at times challenged authority, I imagine it starts with the first "no" to our parents. However, most of us realise the need for authority and accept the laws of our country and law keepers as necessary for the good functioning of society. I admit that I have challenged these but usually because I consider the particular laws unjust, or they conflict with my faith and integrity, or out of compassion for others.

The people challenge Moses' authority: "why did you bring us out of Egypt?" (Exodus 17:3) Moses asks God for help, his authority. He acts out of compassion for his thirsty people, and he's had his time of questioning God.

The chief priests and elders ask Jesus "By what authority are you doing these things?" (Matt 21:23) Jesus, in rabbinic tradition, asks a question in reply. Matthew deliberately has Jesus asking a question about John the Baptist, a prophet, part of the line of prophets, sent by God leading to Jesus. We hear the leaders answer out of their need to hold to their position and power, unlike Moses they do not refer to

God for help but act rather out of fear for the crowds. They want to keep their authority. They were not seeking information but seeking to trap Jesus, they show their deceit in choosing not to answer the question.

"We don't know" can be an acceptable answer. Not the disciples or Paul or religious leaders through history or any person of faith can claim to have all the answers. We should not know all the answers because many questions of faith require discernment, questioning, thought and prayers. Even with deep discernment, we are human and can be wrong, it is better to acknowledge this and seek change or solutions to problems rather than holding emphatically to a position. Through history, we have seen great leaders change their minds or the position they held – Paul, Martin Luther, John Newton for some dramatic ones.

"I don't know" can be a powerful statement of faith if it comes from the heart and hands the power and authority to God. But Jesus knows this is not what the chief priests and leaders are intending. They want to get out of a tricky situation, and they fear the crowds. So often, it can be fear and insecurity that makes us hold to a belief, forgetting God's love and mercy which includes even tax collectors and prostitutes, the despised and outcasts of society.

Jesus then tells a parable, two sons, one does not do what he says he will. The other considers his first response and does what he has declined to do. Here is a message, we have heard before in Matthew's gospel, God requires deeds not empty words. It is our behaviour which speaks most clearly, I think we have all known "once a week Christians". The chief priests and leaders must answer this question because it is about a story, but in doing so, they condemn themselves. Matthew has told us that Pharisees and Sadducees went to hear John the Baptist but did not follow his call.

Under whose authority do we live? Do our words and deeds match? Do we follow those we believe God has called, listening and discerning in decisions in our personal faith, in our church and our community?
