The Outer Darkness seems to be quite a populated space, according to the gospel of Matthew. Unfortunate folk end up engulfed in outer darkness in two preceding chapters of the gospel, and here it is again, this banishment, this eschatological punishment. In Paul's letter to the Thessalonians, he tells them that they do not belong there, reminds them that 'you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness'.

The parable of the talents should be called the parable of the crazy master. Who decides to amass a great wealth, and then leave it all to the staff while they go off on a little sojourn? One talent was worth about 5 years wages! Surely the parable isn't about ensuring we have the best investment strategy, or the highest performing portfolio. Sometimes we talk about the 'talent' in this parable as a gift we've been given, like our personal attributes and things we do well, maybe that's a helpful reading that moves us away from the discomfort of the whole money question, or does it? Some get more and some get less and the ones with more get more and the ones with less get less... quite troubling really.

There is so much more that is troubling about this parable, and completely unfair. It's important to remember that parables are meant to be disturbing, stirring us into a new understanding, shaking us up, waking us up. The timid guy who knows how mean the master is and will not risk his wrath, does what is correct by Jewish law

at the time and buries the money in the ground, safe and sound. They are the one who ends up banished. It's often the case isn't it, that the one who is seen as the least capable, the poorest paid, the most intimidated, who stands up against the expectations of the establishment, is the one who pays the price. Whistle-blower. Here's the door to the outer darkness.

But how about we look again. There is a lot of darkness in the world right now, we only need to turn on the news, if we dare. We are still reeling from the COVID pandemic, and we face a multiplicity of crises, from a gasping earth in the grip of climate change, intractable wars spanning generations and still killing children, disasters wiping out villages, and a refusal to face our history or our shared humanity. It's not an easy time to be children of the light, and yet, that's what we are called to be.

In Matthew's gospel, Jesus is telling this parable on the way to the cross. He is about to give away everything he has and depart, if only for a time. He hands it all over as he breathes the Spirit into our nostrils. What we have been given by this crazy master carpenter is abundant and unending, death-defying love. We have been served the best wine, offered calm in a storm and a place at the table and forgiveness for our running away, our unwillingness and unbelief. Even if we feel like we still have only have a small share of faith, it can be a little light, burning bright, in the terrors of the night. But not if it is buried, it needs to shine. Our task in these days of darkness is to shine our measure of light, to choose to find joy, goodness and grace in the places where we are and to share them around. We can choose to act out of hope and not fear. We can use the time we have been given with wisdom and generosity. We have been entrusted with the wealth of love. So how will you answer when Jesus asks, 'What have you done with what I have given you?'
