A note on singing today: fill your worship with Christmas carols! There are so many songs that people love to sing. Also, be aware of the current desperate conflict in the places that are mentioned in many of these songs, you may want to preface the singing with a pause, a prayer, or simply an acknowledgement of the situation.

Prayer

You might want to use the baptismal font as the final vessel for our Watery Advent Wreath.

- One: As we pour the water to complete our wreath, we celebrate the coming of Jesus. We remember the one who came by water and blood, the one who cried for his dead friend, the one who was thirsty and asked a woman for a drink.
- ALL: We thank you for coming as one of us.
- One We remember the one who walked on water, the one who calmed the waves, the one who turned water into wine.
- ALL: We thank you for coming as one unlike anyone else.
- One We remember the one who is living water for us here and now.
- ALL: We thank you because our thirst for God is quenched in you. Amen.

Prayer

All is done, for the moment; gifts wrapped, or unwrapped, food cooked, or still to prepare, cards to write, journeys to make... All done, for now, for this holy time of worship. put it all aside.

Open your hands and rest them facing upwards in your lap like a cradle

Be still, and know that a child was born, thousands of years ago, and that child still shows us the face of love. Be still, and know that your flesh cradles that very same love.

Be still. Hold a generous time of stillness

Reflecting

A few weeks ago, a banner was hung in my local church that says, "Get ready for God to change the world". As I said this phrase aloud in worship, someone responded with a sense of despair, "I sure hope it happens".

On this day of days, I wonder if you share something of this longing? If so, you are not alone; the story of Jesus' birth is set amongst tyranny and helplessness. In those days, a decree came from the world of power to go back to where you came from. It's time to be counted. It's not great timing for Mary who is heavy and expectant with child. But go they must, to the city of Kings, their city, David's city, Bethlehem. And we sense a struggle for power is brewing.

Things don't seem to be working out for Joseph and Mary. We hear there was no room at the inn and perhaps imagine that all the fancy accommodation was booked out. But it's not quite that glamorous. The inn was likely no better than a shanty, something knocked together to

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give basic cover as overflow. A carport would be overstating what the inn would have been. And already the 'carport' is full.

The conditions are at best basic and simple. Our new couple could likely ill afford the cost of an air BnB. Welcome to the city of kings, young ones. And don't get too romantic about what the manger either. It's just a trough, probably carved out of stone, a place to put the feed for the animals. It's hardly the most hygienic place to lay your newborn. But desperate times ...

If we sensed a clash of powers, the contrast deepens. Jesus is born into a world under the dark cloud of *pax romana*. This is a world where power was used in a brutal way to quell any uprisings. It is a world where the emperor is given the title 'son of God' to legitimise the regime. It is a world where the powerful suck the life out of the vulnerable. It is a world where the mighty live in luxury and know feasting and pleasure while the poor suffer. Into this world Jesus is born. In poverty, amidst the animals, with no place to call home.

Luke sets the scene for a subversion of normal powers. "I sure hope it happens!", that God can change the world. Like my friend, I hope it

happens as well. But I believe it has happened and is happening too.

Jesus will live a life poured out for others. Jesus' rule will be known as counter-cultural, a crown not of precious stones and metals, but one of thorns. Even the greatest of Roman threats, crucifixion, will not stop his unusual power – that of God's love, grace, mercy, forgiveness, salvation. God breaks into our world in flesh and bone. And Jesus brings hope to those who need it; restores dignity to those discarded.

We are sometimes like shepherds out in the dark, in isolated places, needing to hear a spark of hope or renewal. Sometimes we need to look to the heavens to be surprised by the divine. For me that happens literally, seeing a shooting star or the great milky mass of stars at night. It also comes in the witness of new life. God breaks into our world and Jesus becomes God's fleshy, vulnerable, living, breathing, crying presence. How many times has the miracle of life sparked a new hope and wonder in us? How many times have angels (in whatever shape or form) come to us with a word or song that has sparked hope and restored us to life?

Powers still come and take what is not theirs. They still oppress the most vulnerable. But right alongside them is the vulnerable inbreaking of God. When we or those we love struggle, God knows what it is like. When people far away are decimated by brutal forces, God has crept in alongside them and pitched a tent and dwells among them.

Mary ponders the things happening to her. She has already known the spark that caused her to sing with joy. May her song become our song. That God can and does change the world.
