We confess our reluctance to face the confrontation with ourselves, the challenging issues and temptation that the journey of following Christ might hold for us. We confess that we are sometimes tempted to wish for miracles which would make life easier rather than more stressful.

We admire
the difficult and risky journey that Jesus took,
challenging systems
which put conditions on God's love,
but confess
that we want our journeys of faith
to be devout but not too daring;
comfortable and not too threatening.

We cherish the faithfulness and humility of Jesus, yet we confess our fear of walking Jesus' way of obedience - the way of the cross.

Loving Jesus, save us from the time of trial, deliver us from evil and forgive us our sins. Fill us with your joy and peace and strengthen us during this Lenten season to follow you wherever you choose to take us.

Friends, we are secure in the healing, saving love of God, So hear the good news; in Christ Jesus, our sins are forgiven!

Reflecting Rev. Arnie Wierenga

I've just started to watch another of the many series of reality show 'Alone'. For those unfamiliar, ten or so people are dropped in a remote wilderness with just a few survival items, and attempt to stay as long as possible completely isolated from all the usual supports of food, shelter and kin.

After Jesus is baptised by John in the Jordan, we hear that the Spirit drives him into the wilderness. The gospel states succinctly, "He was in the wilderness for forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him."

If you have tapped into the intrigue of 'Alone', you will know that forty days is quite a feat. Time of isolation and vulnerability does lead people to be tempted and taunted and fear the beasts.

We are led to see that this wilderness time is a time of preparation for Jesus. The sequence is telling. Jesus is baptised, the Spirit descends upon him, a voice from the heavens claims him as beloved kin and then he's off to the wilderness. Forty days seems an echo of the forty years that Israel wandered through the wilderness, an allusion to Jesus guiding people now to the promises of God. And then it begins, the time is fulfilled, Jesus commences his ministry as one who brings the kingdom of God near to us. Good news!

I wonder if today we need wilderness times more than ever. One of the attractions of 'Alone' is that people unplug from all the complexity and noise of our human world. No phones, no dinner parties, no watching shows like 'Alone' while eating comfort food – but a rare opportunity to reset, re-evaluate, to remember what has value and to listen in the spaces.

During Lent many people find ways to embark on a 'wilderness journey'. Many will be familiar with giving something up for Lent, as a discipline to live more simply and reminder of things important. Others may actively embark on something new such as walking and noticing. If this passage from Mark's gospel is any guide, it suggests that wilderness time is important to prepare and shape us on this ministry journey.

I don't feel inclined towards the extreme 'Alone' experience, but I know the myriad of daily messages, emails, things to do, hopes, expectations and noise of the world can distract me from things more fundamental in life. As Jesus is baptised, he is claimed as God's beloved son. As we are baptised, it can be easy to forget that we too belong as kin to God and are loved.

Those that survive longest 'Alone' seem to have strength in two key ways: they have a kinship to their environment; they also have a strong sense of kin – those who love them and will be there when they return. The good news of Jesus Christ comes as relationship, an invitation to know God through him, and invitation to belong to God, to know how much God loves us. I see that as the most amazing and most important thing in my life. To see that God reaches out to us until we understand we are known and loved is beyond words.

Perhaps that is why wilderness is so valuable. It strips back all the noise and unnecessary things and humbles us back to basics. I'm sure there are temptations in these spaces to find the easy life and accumulate all those things that promise us comfort. But if we stick long enough with the source of life and love, it will show us that, like Jesus, we are beloved siblings of God. It will help us understand what can be beyond words to understand: that God knows us and loves us.

That's good reason to come back from the wilderness, because that is good news to share!
