And so it begins - this dangerous ride into Jerusalem.

No matter how much we love Jesus, no matter how much hope he inspires, no matter how deeply we are restored through God's love in him, it's clearly hard for us to stay the course. But for a moment we celebrate and cheer and adore the one in whom we invest our future, our hope, our life, our longings for salvation.

Have you ever been caught up in an excited crowd? Sporting event, famous person passing by, a large act of worship, being wowed by the Matildas, circus performers or formation flyers... Sociologists call this collective effervescence, the sparkle, the bubbles that tingle where we find ourselves together as a mob and carried away in the moment.

Every Palm Sunday we celebrate this extraordinary account of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. There is already a festival atmosphere. The crowds

are building up to celebrate Passover, recalling the story of God where the people of Israel are freed from lives of slavery in Egypt. Freedom is worth celebrating, and often Passover begins with great pomp. The crowds are primed and ready.

In John's account of the story, festival goers hear that Jesus is about to arrive. They meet him with palm branches and claim him as Messiah. Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

If they were ready for a celebration, add the longing for Messianic hope and things just take off. Who knows what people wanted in their Messiah. Naming Jesus the King of the Jews publicly is a dangerous thing. Perhaps it's difficult to control a rowdy crowd, but we can see trouble here for Jesus. The quickest way to quell a mob is to dispose of its leader. That's always been the way ...

Whatever hopes and dreams are captured by the crowd, they likely don't expect or want what comes after. If Jesus is to be Messiah, some things don't match the hype. A donkey? Hardly triumphal transport. A crown of thorns? A great way to mock a failed revolutionary who wants to be king.

Throughout the season of Lent we have grappled with the identity of Jesus. The great disciple Peter has named him as Messiah, but almost in the next breath has gotten in the way of Jesus' path towards the cross. There is frequent misunderstanding and mystery, such as happens with the transfiguration of Jesus. As John writes, it's only on the other side of Jesus' glory that the disciples find understanding.

I enjoy a great crowd celebration. There is something about it that can lift us beyond the everyday and find hope and joy that is hard to realise on our own.

Maybe we need to celebrate today to help with the journey this coming week. It's not an easy one. So, amidst this high day of our calendar, we prepare for one coming that is even greater in exposing God's love for the world. The one that God raises is no great King of Israel fighting against Rome. The one that God raises from the dead comes riding on a donkey, wears a crown of thorns, dies, and is buried. And in his rising again, exposes and diminishes those other powers and breaks apart life as we know it.

Let's take a deep breath. There is so much more to come. Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

We bring before you those we know who are sick or sad. We name them in our hearts. Some of them from our faith community, from our family and our wider community of friends.


"God's faithful love lasts forever!"
