Christ is risen: He is risen indeed, Alleluia!


Acknowledging

Reflecting

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia! I wonder what we expect when we arrive at Easter morning? We might gather early, at a dawn service, or later in the morning, or even in the quiet of the evening. Whatever time we come, what expectation do we bring with us?

I remember my granddaughter's face when she first encountered living, moving, breathing, stomping elephants. Earlier this year, we were at the Melbourne Zoo, and she had just turned 2 years old. We'd been showing her elephants in books, and she had a stuffed toy elephant that she loved, and now we were going to see them at the zoo!

she was terrified. She couldn't look at them. Frozen with fear, she cried to be picked up and comforted. Whatever she was seeing, however magnificent, was not what she expected.

The company of women; Mary, Mary and Salome, who walk to the tomb to anoint Jesus for proper burial at the end of the gospel of Mark, come when the Sabbath has ended, very early, when the sun has risen. They bring spices, anticipating that they will encounter the body of Jesus. They talk on the way about logistics, about who will roll the heavy stone from the tomb's entrance, expecting it to still be sealed as they had left it.

What they find is that the stone is rolled away, and they enter the tomb. Given that the tomb is open, their expectations may have changed quickly. Maybe now they are becoming concerned, wondering if someone has taken the body of their beloved. No wonder then, they become alarmed. They are alarmed because before them is a young man, dressed in white, who speaks to them. He tries to calm their alarm. He tells them he knows who they are looking for and that Jesus, who was crucified, has been raised and is not here – see, the empty place where he was laid. It seems that they don't take in the directions to 'go' and 'tell'. They can't. They are frozen with fear. No matter how magnificent this outcome is, it's not at all what they

and amazement and say nothing. The last word of the gospel of Mark, of this ending anyway, is the word – afraid.

For my granddaughter, every image of an elephant is now connected to the experience of that first encounter. Now she'll visit them in the zoo, for a short time anyway. She still loves them but maintains a certain wide-eyed concern in their presence. She's coming around to seeing the magnificence of the beasts.

Do we ever come around to really seeing the magnificence of the resurrection? Did that first company of women; Mary, Mary and Salome ever recover from their fear? Whatever we expect to encounter as we approach the empty tomb, it will rarely be what we find, because, like them, we expect so little.

Is it possible that this God, who raised Jesus from the dead, has given us a glimpse of a love that holds us in life even beyond the rupture of death? Is it possible that as we encounter the emptiness of the tomb, we recognise the absence as a wholly holy presence, breathing peace into every living thing in our world? Is it possible that we might see this day as a new beginning, a new and magnificent invitation to 'go and tell'? Perhaps. But it might take us a little getting used to. Like the women, we might need a space of silence, because, given the whole immensity of this magnificent new reality, we may well be afraid.
