Reflecting

"As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love." John 15:9

"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." John 15:12-13

The current conflict in the Middle East between Israel and Hamas (Gaza) is only one of the many long and bitter conflicts that have played out on that region. I have stood on top of the Golan Heights in Israel and seen trenches left from previous wars. And I have been at Caesarea Phillipi, where Peter first confessed that Jesus was the Christ, whilst United Nations peacekeepers patrolled around battlements in this volatile place.

But, the experience that most drove home to me the terror, the horror and the human cost of these conflicts was hearing Terry Waite speak about his experiences as a captive of Hezbollah in Beirut during the Lebanese civil war in the 1980's.

You might remember that during the 1980's, a range of terrorist groups and regimes, including Hezbollah, undertook heinous acts which included hijacking and blowing up planes, suicide bombings, and kidnapping and sometimes killing hostages.

Terry Waite, who was the Archbishop of Canterbury's envoy, undertook risky negotiations with some of these groups to try to secure the release of hostages. He was successful in missions to Iran, Libya, and Lebanon between 1980 and 1985. Then in 1987, when he travelled to Lebanon to try to secure the release of four hostages, he was himself kidnapped and held for 1,763 days.

Terry was held in solitary confinement for most of that time. He was shackled in chains, often kept in the dark, and frequently tortured. It was brutal, inhumane treatment. It was designed to humiliate and distress, and it threatened Terry's health and sanity. Throughout this difficult time, Terry gained comfort from his faith, and from reciting the prayers from the Anglican Book of Common Prayer that he had learned by heart.

He missed his family and friends dreadfully, but only received one piece of mail during his whole time in captivity (although thousands of people wrote to him). It was a postcard from a stranger. It depicted John Bunyan in his prison cell in Bedford Jail, and the message on the back read, "Dear Terry, You are not forgotten. People everywhere are praying for your release, and that of the other hostages. With best wishes, Joy Brodier."

This card gave Terry great comfort at a very low point. In a speech he made after his release, he referred to Joy sending him that postcard and said, "I would say to you all, never despise those simple actions. Something, somewhere, will get through to the people you are concerned about, as at got through to me and my fellow hostages eventually."

Now, it is clear to me that Terry Waite's actions of risking his life to try to negotiate the release of hostages in Lebanon, was an act of costly and sacrificial love. He was, and still is, a true servant of Jesus Christ, and he followed the example of Christ in being willing to lay down his life for the sake of those who were in captivity and being threatened with execution. And he paid a high price for that act of love.

I'm not sure that I could ever be as brave and unselfish as Terry was in willingly venturing into such a dangerous situation. But, I guess, we don't know our capacity for bravery and self-giving love unless we are put to the test.

It was impressive, however, to see how quite a few people acted with great courage to try to protect others when Joel Cauchi started stabbing people in a Bondi shopping centre on 13th April. In response to this and other horrible events, a letter writer in The Age this week noted that "for every person who does a horrible attack we see heroes coming to help." He also wrote, "We should not live in fear but join together to celebrate those who keep us safe, both incidental heroes and our emergency services..."

I'm sure that he is right. We should acknowledge that those who acted with courage in the face of danger showed truly self-giving love of the sort that Jesus calls his followers to emulate. But then, it is also true, that we have been created by God to be people who love and serve one another. This lies at the heart of the Gospel, and it is our reason for living. So, we should do our best to find ways, large and small, to show love to one another.

There are many ways in which we can show that we love one another. Some of them are as simple as the postcard Joy Brodier sent Terry Waite in prison. But just maybe, the most difficult, but also the most important way we can show love is to be people who do all we can to try to end the cycles of hatred, disunity, power abuse, violence, and war. To be people who work to bring about reconciliation, mutual respect and peace in our own communities and across the world in whatever way we can.

Terry Waite went back to Beirut in 2012 and met with some of his captors, seeking to put the past behind and forge a new way forward, and found he was able to work constructively with them to help others. If he, who had suffered so much, could do this, surely we can find ways to build love and peace in our communities and beyond.
