Reflecting

Robert McAfee Brown is famously quoted for saying “Where we stand determines what we see” however, this quote only comes into its fullest understanding when read within the context of the whole thought McAfee Brown offered.

“Who we listen to determines what we hear.
Where we stand determines what we see.
What we do determines who we are.”

There couldn't be a simpler expression for us today as we wrestle with what it is to celebrate the God we love as Trinitarian. Holy One, Holy Three. The temptation is great to become distracted in trying to understand how three beings can truly be one, all equal in their standing, yet each one unique and dynamic in their interrelationality. I'm certainly not suggesting that we don't do the work (each and everyone of us) of trying to dive into the mystery of God, however what we miss when we get stuck and can't see beyond this complex mystery is indeed the very thing God desires for us to see. The Divine Nurturer continuing to make ways for the love they have for all humanity to be made known. The expression of the Godhead in relationship with thine own self and with us. The full communion between God and humanity restored in right relationship.

Who we listen to determines what we hear.
There is so much noise in our world nowadays that it is challenging to focus our thoughts. News reports,

social media, advertising, well-meaning friends, historical understandings, political lobbyists, unions, song lyrics and more all bombard us, dividing our attention and distracting us from listening deeply to what God is speaking into the world. At the outset of the gospel passage, Nicodemus approaches Jesus under the cover of darkness, some would say symbolic of his spiritual blindness and limited understanding. However, I wonder whether we might consider this afresh. What if Nicodemus came to Jesus under the cover of darkness not because of fear, but rather because it was a moment of quietness offering the opportunity to engage deeply with one another in meaningful conversation. Being able to put aside all of the “noise” influencing his thinking as Nicodemus wrestles with shifting his hearing and creating new understandings of what their relationship with God is. A relationship founded in love.

Where we stand determines what we see.
Today is National Sorry Day, or rather National Day of Healing and it would be remiss not to acknowledge the depth and gravity of all that means.

As a Uniting Church we are continually being confronted with the noise of society, whether that is the overwhelming wrestle we have with recognition for our first nations brothers and sisters, or the vast and ever evolving membership of the LGBTIQ+ people in our midst, those who have come to our shores seeking refuge or the many others we encounter each and every day as we seek to be co-workers with God in the reconciliation of the whole creation through Christ, we must first stop to listen deeply to hear what God is speaking into the world. We say all are made in the image of God. We say the table is long and the table is wide and yet we find ourselves being confronted with our own challenges to hear above the noise and respond from a place of love. What if our first thinking, our first point is to remember the love God has for the whole of God's creation and the deep desire God has to be reconciled and in right relationship with all humanity. How might we then pray for one another and plead for one another as God's children and heirs with one another, for surely the table is long and the table is wide.

What we do determines who we are. It seems to me that if we continue to trace the cycle of McAfee Brown's words, we find ourselves inevitably returning to the darkness of night and with Nicodemus in the quiet of the moment engaging deeply with Jesus as we try to make sense of what it is to be so beloved by the Holy Trinity. For isn't that just the way of things?
