

Reflecting

Some thirty years ago I was chatting with a fellow stallholder at Salamanca Market in Hobart. He was a maker of fine leather goods and I was a woodturner (still am!). I remember this day because he said something that stunned me. "You know we shouldn't be talking to each other." While we shared a Dutch background, he was Catholic, and I Protestant, although how he even knew that puzzled me.

I've since learnt that my mother's family were Huguenot refugees from France. In the 16th and 17th centuries, a protestant movement inspired by the teachings of John Calvin threatened the powerful Roman Catholic church. Many fled for their lives across the globe. Holland was a safe haven for my ancestors.

Understanding history can inform choices for a better today. Earlier this year Poowong celebrated 150 years since the town was founded. As churches gathered for an ecumenical celebration, Father Peter Slater recalled the vital importance of Vatican II in 1962. It was a key moment in history that enabled Catholic cooperation with Protestants.

I was drawn to the Uniting Church as a teenager. A key reason was that she promised to be a church embedded in the local landscape. My migrant family longed for their homeland, but that homeland was foreign to me. I wanted to know First Nations people. And I was drawn to the dynamic nature of the Uniting Church. The promise of being a pilgrim people; the promise of uniting as a word of action; the promise of building relationships across the churches beyond the three that formed us.

But it's not easy. It's not easy to build bridges or cross divides. Some ideas challenge so deeply they seem a bridge too far. It's not easy to uphold the vision of uniting when change takes so much energy, and our resources seem so depleted. In the gospel passage, we listen to the final prayer of Jesus and we are drawn into a desire for unity – that disciples may be one, as Jesus and the Father are one.

Reflecting on this passage, Rev. Bill Loader says salvation isn't something earned (say by following Jesus or confessing him as Lord), but rather lived in relationship. Jesus seeks unity with God. Jesus longs for communion with the Father, Son, Holy Spirit and that longing extends to us. Communion means uniting with all who seek the pilgrim path of Jesus. In other words, the good news of Jesus Christ is shown in community, where the love of God is lived out in its fullest sense. That challenges how we view other denominations, other congregations, and even other members of our own faith communities. I'm aware that taking time to understand those who seem alien is vital to finding that which unites us. Being a student of history helps illuminate otherwise unconscious attitudes that hinder us.

If salvation is lived in community as an expression of God's love, then that calls us to find ways to love those we don't wish to talk to – those who have wronged us; those whose faith practices we do not understand; those who we mistrust historically; those whose company we do not enjoy...

At her best, this is the Uniting Church, a pilgrim people on the way towards the promised end. Our foundations commit us to constantly correct what is erroneous in our life, and that which will bring us into deeper unity with other churches.

It is timely that Act 2 is moving us, as it reminds us of the visionary work that birthed our church. Act 2 calls us to be enlivened and encouraged in the Spirit, to be renewed in our work. As hard as that may seem, I long for deep communion as Jesus describes. And that longing sets us on a uniting path as pilgrims in his name.

We will live and work within the faith and unity of the one holy catholic and apostolic church, bearing witness to that unity which is both Christ's gift and his will.


We affirm that every member of the church is engaged to confess the faith of Christ crucified.
