Transformation comes in speaking truth to power. In this week's reading we find ourselves just settling into the plight of Jairus when it is interrupted with a story within a story. A narrative in Mark's gospel we no doubt have all encountered on many occasions. An entwining of stories we remember because of the feelings it elicits within us. The questions it raises within us around faith, hope, life, death, healing, worthiness, power and the kingship of Jesus just to name a few and we are invited into this profound moment in Jesus ministry where two miracles take place. We are invited to witness these two moments were life is restored and living begins once more.

Jairus and the bleeding woman come to Jesus not just with an urgency but a sense of certainty that Jesus has the capacity (the power) to do something radical for them.

Jairus comes to Jesus and pleads his case as a parent in despair because his daughter is near death. Without hesitation Jesus follows Jairus at his request to where his daughter is being tended and its on the way that Jesus encounters the woman who is bleeding.

Scripture tells us that she has endured this condition for 12 years and has exhausted all her resources in trying to become well. When this woman encounters Jesus among the crowds, she reaches out to touch his garment. I imagine that as a woman who was marginalised and on the outside of her community due to her condition she may have reached out to Jesus in that place and in that way because of the cover of the crowd still pressing in around Jesus. A moment when she could anonymously reach her desired goal - to be healed of her haemorrhaging and begin to live again. Yet the moment she connects with Jesus, not only does SHE feel something transformative happen, but Jesus also feels something transformative. Jesus now aware that something has taken place asks who touched his cloak rather than "who did this?" When she responds owning her actions Jesus doesn't reprimand her but rather celebrates with her in her moment of new

beginnings. A moment of resurrection for this woman as the magnitude of what it means for her to now be able to re-enter the community to which she belongs is made real for her.

It is at that moment we are prompted to return with Jesus on Jairus' original journey, for people came out from Jairus' home to announce that it was no longer necessary for them to hurry on as Jairus' daughter had died. Jesus consoles Jairus and tells him not to fear. Taking the three disciples with him – Peter, James and John they enter the house. Jesus sends out of the house, those whose belief couldn't let them see beyond what was tangible. Then with the child's parents and the disciples Jesus speaks and the girl is restored to life.

In both stories Jesus sees the person, puts their needs first and responding with compassion and empathy uses the means he has to create wholeness and life. Jesus doesn't question their request of him or the depth of their faith, but rather sees them each for who they are and acts within his means to serve them.

As we daily move among our communities this reading offers us a glimpse of what it looks like to speak truth to power. To look beyond the differences we have, to see into the marginal spaces and see the whole person in the same way Jesus sees Jairus, his daughter and the bleeding woman and respond with compassion and empathy. When we look upon one another with a Jesus glance and a lens of love, we recognise that we are all created within the divine community. In this knowledge we can build up the capacity in one another to speak truth to power, seeing the delights in our differences which ultimately enables us to be filled with awe as the breadth and depth of God's love is made manifest across the

world.

Poetic reflection:

Restored - Mark 5:21-43 of course I knew what I was reaching through: barricades of fear constructed year upon year to keep me away, to keep me at bay

and yet I was already spent too long alone, unclean, unclaimed, unnamed that's why I went

I knew I risked the razor-wire of reproach: how do you dare approach this holy man and breech the borders of death and order with your unclean hand, to steal a healing

but I believed he could make me well and as his power poured through every cell and my life-force was contained when my heart received a name:

he called me 'daughter'
