#### **Homeward Bound**

Mark 6:4 Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honour, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house."

You can trust your family to bring you down to earth, that's for sure. No matter how well you're doing in your career, amongst your peers, in social circles or any other circle, when it comes to family, almost always you will be levelled out and not singled out. Families have a way of equalising, homogenising so no one can rise to the top. That's not always a bad thing, but it can mean that we miss out on the blessings from our siblings that others not so connected might enjoy.

Jesus encounters this dynamic in the synagogue in his hometown. Even though they are amazed at his wisdom and power, they can't accept it from him. They want to know where he got it, as if he won it in a late-night poker game or stole it from a sleeping giant. They want to know where he got it, because they've been trying to get it their whole lives and maybe they just haven't looked in the right place. They want to know where he got it because it makes them feel less important than Jesus, who, really, is just a hometown boy, and that's extremely uncomfortable.

Who do we dismiss because we know them too well, or think we know them too well and what is the cost, what have we lost?

How does it feel when your gifts are not received because someone is stuck in a preconceived idea of who you are or what you are after?

Where are the signposts that we are not willing to read because of our unexamined assumptions about who is holding the sign?

Have we domesticated Jesus to the point where he is simply our big-brother-hometown hero, and we dismiss the disturbingly wise and miraculous presence of the healing holy?

Jesus responds to being dishonoured, not with anger, but with amazement, and continues his teaching tour, with a few small healings of the sick. Then he sends out the twelve, with power and nothing else, to continue the work that he has begun. He responds to being dismissed by multiplying his capacity in the actions of the ones around him, and it works. No need to go back to the synagogue and point that out, no doubt, word would have got around already.

'Take nothing,' Jesus says to the twelve but not to us, because we have so much and we can't leave it behind. We have traditions, expectations, regulations and property. How do we, who are a pilgrim people on the way, hear these words of Jesus?

In a conversation about how we can make a difference to the very difficult reality of homelessness in our area, I asked an intake worker what we could do when we find someone sleeping rough on the back porch of the church. The quick and simple reply, "Unlock the door."

We can get so complacent and distracted about knowing who we are, and protecting who we are, that we miss the sending of Jesus when it is right before us. We forget that we have been given the power to help and to heal. We can fail to reach out because our arms are too occupied with holding on to what we think we need. Yet, each time we do connect with someone who is isolated, each time we allow a healing hand to rest on a point of pain, each time we listen with care and without interrupting, we light a candle in the darkness of despair, we bring hope, we make miracles happen. We do the awesome work of Jesus of Nazareth, Jesus the Christ, and he is among us. May it be so, Amen.
