Reflecting Rev. Fee Morrison

In Luke's sermon on the plain, after we have heard the blessings and woes, we move this week to how we should live in community, the ways we should as groups of faithful people should operate as a group.

This is a very hard text, it's not meant to be easy. As a community we should place importance on forgiveness, that works together to love enemies even if I can't love them, the rest of my community can, till in time I can.

It resonates with our reading from Genesis of Joseph's story, which is all about how God brings reconciliation, bringing family members back together into a new future and new possibilities. How is God active in reconciliation, are we allowing God to be active in the reconciliation of our community between people who do not get on?

As I said this is not an easy task but Psalm 37 reminds us to ground ourselves in the delight of the Lord, use this as our basis this will give us grace and hope for living our Luke 6 in our communal life.

Jesus is saying these things to those who are ready to accept Jesus' call, "I say to those of you who listen".

Luke is emphasising that love is not just a sentiment of feeling but an attitude leading to concrete action, much easier if we could just leave it as a feeling. The call is for us as disciples to embrace mercy – do as God would do! Jesus' response is do good to those who would do bad to us – do as God would do!

As we come to our last Sunday of Epiphany we are reminded that the inbreaking of God into the world makes a difference, it should, we hope as a community of faith – make all the difference in how we respond to people.

The call of Jesus in Luke is to live in a way that is contrary to our human nature, as we live out the good news of God as Jesus in the world with the hope of the resurrection to sustain us. This faith we have is a way of life, a way that is contrary to our natural

inclinations. To answer hurt with forgiveness, which is only possible because Christ is our hope.

God came to us humans, as a human in Jesus, to reveal God's purpose, to love us all, not just as a baby in a manger but to teach us a more compassionate way of living. Let us as communities of faith live out God's mercy and love.
