Reflecting Rev. Fee Morrison

I am struck by the Isaiah and Psalm reading this week, by the invitation to feasting. Even though we are in the middle of Lent, a time of repentance, here we are invited to feast on God's love.

Isaiah is set in the era of God's people in exile. Most of this reading is set in God's voice and feels very intimate with Isaiah interjecting occasionally. In Isaiah, the Psalm and Luke today, we are reminded that God does not promise that life will be smooth and easy, but what God does promise is that God is with us, and inviting us to share in the joy that God is with us, giving us hope and sustaining us. The real question for us as individuals and as a community of faith is how does our faith alter how we live our lives in the everyday things?

Isaiah 55 and Psalm 63 are an invitation to rejoice in a difficult and challenging time and that God's rule is marked by justice and peace. Isaiah leads us to God's openness and desire to bless us and we are all invited to partake in the blessing. Isaiah urges us to not delay in our RSVP to God's invitation. It's an invitation to not be stuck in our own failings, feelings or stuck in place of sin or a bad place.

This invitation acknowledges our place with God. It starts with a longing for a drink of water in the desert and is transformed into a feast later. When I read this. I am reminded of the scenes in the Harry Potter films where they have end of term feasts at the school and there are platters of all sorts of food and drinks floating above the table for all to indulge and plenty to go around. How great, lavish and free is God's feast for us all, and there is no cost to us.

Have we forgotten that we are invited to a rich and indulgent banquet? Sometimes we can become a little bit stingy about what we share as if we are on rations from God instead of a feast of love and abundance. What is holding us back, keeping us in the past, rather than stepping into the new thing that God is doing, and inviting us to be a part of? We are invited to to enjoy the feast and love of God.

How does our faith alter the way we live? Do you live a life that has the hope of joy like the people in Isaiah? Their joy was an act of defiance. We get ground down by our society, politics, expectations etc and it becomes a weight not a joy. Faith is a defiant act against society. The joy God offers us is what alters us and sustains us and gives us hope. How does your faith shape your life in the everyday?

I invite you to reflect on when you have been blessed or have received abundantly. Are we living out our faith in concrete ways in our local community (not just church community), in our neighbourhood – living out God's kin-dom?

Are you attending God's feast? Will you RSVP yes?
