#### Where are we?

In the cycle of the church year, last week was the end of the season of Epiphany. Next week we begin the journey of Lent towards Good Friday and Easter. Today we celebrate the Transfiguration of Jesus. This is a mountain top day; a climb, a blinding vision, a voice saying, 'listen' and a coming back down to earth. This is a time to reflect on the mystery of God and the moments when we have been overwhelmed by God's presence.

### Prayer

Loving and surprising God, we come with hearts full of gratitude for those mountain-top moments when we sense your presence so close.

Often in grief, sometimes in delight, and even when we're doing something ordinary you come with your startling light.

In the hand of a friend, in the prayers of the faithful, in the words of a song, in the sun rising to bless another day: vou come to us and tell us to listen to the one who calls us by name.

In the quiet we bask in your light feeling the warmth of your love flow through our bodies from the earth below, feeling the breath of your Spirit fill up our lungs from the air around us. feeling the mystery of the stars draw us closer to you from beyond our knowing, we are still in your presence... (time of quiet)

Loving and surprising God mixed with our gratitude is fear; we are afraid of failing, of getting it wrong, of messing things up, of saying the wrong things. Forgive us when we hurt others by what we do and say and what we fail to do and say. And sometimes when you tell us to listen we shut down and turn away, because of our fear. Forgive us when we talk instead of listening, when we're too full of ourselves to let you or others in. (time of quiet)

Brothers and sisters in Christ, God is with us, on the mountain top and at the kitchen sink, in the playground, the office and the nursing home, at the break of day and in the darkest night bringing light, healing and hope.

Be assured, we are forgiven thanks be to God, Amen.

# Reflecting - Rev. Jennie Gordon

The beginning of A.A. Milne's poem *Us Two* reminds me of today's reading from 2 Kings: *Wherever I am, there's always Pooh, There's always Pooh and Me. Whatever I do, he wants to do,*"Where are you going today?" says Pooh:

"Well, that's very odd 'cos I was too.

Let's go together," says Pooh, says he.

"Let's go together," says Pooh.

Elisha was not letting Elijah out of his sight. He was going wherever Elijah was going, whatever it took. Three times Elijah told Elisha to 'stay here' and three times Elisha kept on going beside Elijah. Until he couldn't. He couldn't go on that final journey, in the chariots of fire, and when Elisha finally lost sight of his master he tore his clothes in grief.

In the reading from Mark, Elijah, Moses and a dazzling Jesus are standing on a mountain top and the only thing Peter can think of is that he wants to keep them all there together. So he will build them a little village to dwell happily ever after. He wants to hold on to the moment, to the company, at least until he understands what's going on. But he can't. Elisha wants to hold on to Elijah, but he can't and at least he asks for a double share of his spirit so he can always carry a significant part of his beloved teacher with him.

Does Peter want to keep them all on the mountain because he's afraid of what lies ahead for Jesus and for himself? The walk down the mountain begins the journey to Jerusalem. Does Elisha want to keep Elijah with him because he's afraid of what God might ask him to do, on his own?

Peter has the image of the transfigured Jesus to accompany him through the dark and troubled times ahead. Elisha has the image of the chariots of fire and the mantle of Elijah to accompany him through the troubled times ahead. Is Jesus encouraged and empowered by the events of the transfiguration and the encounter with Elijah and Moses? Does he carry that with him to the cross?

I wonder what you carry? What mountain top memory, or psalm, hymn or text assures you that God is with you, gives you comfort and helps you keep going? I was with my younger sister when she received the worst news possible from her oncologist about the multiplication of her brain tumours. We sat together in a small waiting room and Psalm 23; The Lord is my shepherd..., came tumbling out through our tears.

Wherever I go, there's always Pooh... Wherever I go, there's always the presence of the risen Christ, the shepherd, often in a stranger's guise, sometimes in my own. We are not alone. We go together, each of us, all of us in the company of the Spirit of Wisdom. Sometimes we are given dazzling mountain-top moments where we get to glimpse God's glory, but most often we are not. Still we carry with us the assurance we need to keep us going, down the mountain and on through life. May it be so, Amen.
