

Thanks be to God. Amen.



Reflecting

The gifts of fear, doubt and disbelief

filled with wonder and amazement, utterly astonished... it's important to read the beginning of the story from Acts, from the start of chapter 3, to sense just how the people were reacting to Peter and John's healing of a man who had been unable to walk from birth. Peter's proclamation, the set text for the week from the book of Acts, flows directly from this event.

startled and terrified, in joy and disbelieving... the gospel of Luke describes the reactions of 'the eleven and their companions' at the sudden appearance of the risen Jesus. He asks them why they are frightened and why doubts arise in their hearts. It is as if he had expected something else, something deeper, maybe a little more enthusiastic and enlightened.

These two stories hold some common truths for us. That our first response to something beyond our understanding, good news or bad, will probably be disbelief and possibly even fear. That the Spirit of God, present in that moment, will continue to be alongside us as we grapple with the new truth before us. That these situations offer an opportunity for our minds to grow and our hearts to be more fully opened.

We all appreciate our comfort zones. When life is known, balanced and unfolding as we expect, mostly we go about our daily tasks with ease and sleep well in our beds. When the usual patterns of our days are disrupted, we are thrown off balance and can be filled with fear and doubt, making it hard to do even the simplest things, especially falling asleep.

Recently I was listening to a young woman who had accepted a proposal of marriage from her dearly loved companion. Her confusion was that, instead of feeling completely overjoyed, optimistic and totally blissed, like everyone

around her, she was 'freaking out'. "This always happens at big life-moments. I didn't choose to fall in love with him, and now this. It's the most incredible and amazing thing ever, and I'm so scared." In letting yourself go, falling further into love, committing your life alongside another, the risk is so great, it's massive. As we talked, she sensed that her fear response had come from being thrown off balance by this mighty force of love, overwhelmed by the unimaginable possibilities of life together.

The risen Jesus is patient with the gathering in their joyful unbelief. He shows them his wounds, he eats fish in front of them. He reminds them of the fulfillment of scripture, of the voices of the prophets, of the mission of repentance and forgiveness that they carry, beginning in Jerusalem and spreading to all nations.

Peter and John are patient with the crowds, telling them about the power of the risen Christ, reminding them of the words of the prophets and about their actions in sending Jesus to the cross; 'you killed the Author of life,' and stating again God's action of raising him from the dead.

The Spirit is patient with us, in this Easter time, when again we are overwhelmed by the force of love that defeats death and maybe even thrown off balance by the mystery of eternal life. Fear may arise, along with doubt and disbelief, as we struggle to make sense of this outrageous gift. Let them come, they have things to teach us. Through doubt and fear we can journey deeper into the unknown. Through the lostness of disbelief we can find new paths to travel and new insights to guide us. We are assured of the constant presence of God through all the changes and challenges of our lives and even as we walk through the valley of death. As Psalm 4, verse 9 reminds us, 'safe and sound, I lie down and sleep, for you alone, O Lord, keep me secure.'

May it be so, Amen.

May the grace of God flow through us. May the love of God keep us whole. May the peace and presence of the Spirit be our guide. And the blessing of God be with us always.


