



Gathering & Lighting the Candle

Acts 4:11 This Jesus is 'the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone.'

Set a large stone on the table near the candle. Have some smaller stones for people to pick up during the prayer. You may want to have a world map on the table for the Prayers of the People.

Light the candle, Jesus, the Good Shepherd, the cornerstone of our faith is the light in the darkness.

Call to worship

Good Shepherd, gather us in, not to be an exclusive, comfortable flock, but to be a courageous congregation offering sanctuary and welcome.

Cornerstone of our faith, gather us in, not to lock us into a rigid framework but to shape us into your self-giving

but to shape us into your self-giving likeness as we build our lives on you.

Source, Son and Spirit, be present with us in this time, guide our hearts, open our minds fill us with your peace. Amen.

Acknowledging

As we gather in this place, we acknowledge that the ground beneath our feet, and the air and water around us is sacred. We acknowledge the traditional custodians of this sacred place and pay respects to elders past, present and emerging. We commit ourselves to walking together in justice and in truth.

refrain


We have been crucified with Christ, now we shall live forever. refrain

Listening

Read: John 10:11-18

Prayer

This prayer begins with the 23rd Psalm and then moves from the image of 'shepherd' to the image of 'cornerstone' - allow enough time to make the transition. Invite people to pick up a stone during the silence.

Psalm 23

The LORD is my shepherd, I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul.

He leads me in right paths for his name's sake.

Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil:

for you are with me; your rod and your staff-they comfort me.

You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life,

and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD my whole life long.

Good Shepherd who leads us in right paths, we confess that so often we wander off, we stop following your lead, we forget the sound of your voice.

For the times when we have gone astray, in our own lives of faith and as your people, the church, Forgive us, lead us back

(time of quiet, pick up a stone)

Cornerstone of our faith, the very first stone, the rock, the building block of our lives, we confess that we have rejected you in so many ways:

by what we have done and failed to do, by what we have spoken and failed to speak and by how we have failed to trust you and to build our lives on your love.

For the times when we have rejected you, in our own lives of faith and as your people, the church Forgive us, be our cornerstone

(time of quiet - you may want to replace the stones near the candle or place them near a cross)

Followers of the risen Christ, know this; that the building block that was rejected became the cornerstone of a new world.

Be assured, we are known and loved, we belong in this new world and we are forgiven,

Thanks be to God, Amen.

Reflecting

There is an old Chinese proverb that tells the story of a fox that was captured by a tiger. The tiger was going to eat the fox, but was startled when the fox said, "You can't eat me!" The tiger retorted, "Of course I can eat you!" "No, you can't," the fox replied. "You can't eat me because the gods have made me the leader of all the animals."

Now the tiger didn't believe the fox, but the fox offered to demonstrate his leadership by saying, "Follow me and see if any animal challenges me. If any animal challenges me, then you can eat me."

The tiger was intrigued but disbelieving, but agreed to do as the fox suggested. They set off through the forest, with the tiger directly behind the fox.

To the tiger's amazement it turned out to be exactly as the fox had said. Not a single animal challenged the fox. Indeed, every animal they met fled in sheer panic. The tiger conceded that the fox was the leader of all the animals and let him go.

The proverb teaches us that it is easy to be brave when we have a tiger behind us.

In today's story from The Book of Acts, Peter acts as if he has a tiger standing behind him. He is full of courage, with a heart on fire with God's love, as he heals the beggar and then preaches to the astonished crowd. Even after he is arrested, thrown into jail overnight and then brought before the council of the Scribes and Jewish leaders for questioning, he proclaims his determination to continue to preach Jesus Christ, crucified and risen and at work in the world healing and saving people.

Anyone who had seen Peter back in those awful sad hours when Jesus was on trial for his life in this very same place would have been astonished at the change in him. Back then, on Easter Thursday, Peter had been a frightened man who had strenuously denied even knowing Jesus. Now he has changed completely. He not only acknowledges knowing Jesus, but goes on to proclaim that it is through faith in Jesus Christ that he has been able to heal the lame man.

Some of Peter's courage may have come from knowing that the crowd was on his side, but he knew very well that crowds can be fickle. But we can be confident that the big change in Peter has come about because he has witnessed the resurrection of Jesus Christ and has been filled with the power of God's Holy Spirit. He is no longer functioning just in his own strength, for he now has God's strength and guidance to give him courage and the right words to proclaim.

He knows the truth that is proclaimed in 1 John 3:23-24, "And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us."

It is this indwelling of God's Holy Spirit that has so remarkably changed Peter and the other disciples. It is not like an insurance policy that protects against suffering, but rather it is the very real promise of God's love, presence, comfort and guidance always Peter discovered, as can we, that there is no place that we can go, and there is no experience that we can enter into, that Jesus does not go there with us. This is God's promise to us.

Now and always. Amen.

Can also be sung to the well known tune: AURELIA TIS 93


