Waking or sleeping, thy presence my light.


Be thou my wisdom, be thou my true Word;

(keep silence)


And we pray:

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Reflecting

Wisdom is an important topic in the Scriptures. In fact, part of the Bible is often called the wisdom literature consisting of the books of Job, Proverbs and Ecclesiastes. However, talk of wisdom is not confined to those books, but rather the search for wisdom and the desirability of finding wisdom and being wise, is a major underlying theme in the Bible. It is also an important assumption in much Biblical teaching, so perhaps, we should not be surprised that in today's readings we have talk of wisdom in three different books and contexts.

Firstly, we have King Solomon who has the experience of the Lord God coming to him one night in a dream. God offers to grant him whatever he wants.

Wow! What an offer! I don't know about you, but I think I would struggle to decide what I wanted most. So, it's a real credit to Solomon that he gives a carefully thought-out answer. He firstly thanks God for the gift of love that he has shown his father, David, and himself. He then acknowledges that he perceives that his youth and inexperience make governing his people a difficult proposition for him, and so, he asks, "Give me the wisdom I need to rule your people with justice and to know the difference between good and evil." 1 Kings 3:9a

We are told that God was very pleased with Solomon's unselfish request, and grants him his desire, but also grants him wealth and honour. In Psalm 111:10 (Good News) we have a piece of advice, pertaining to wisdom. "The way to become wise is to honour the Lord; he gives sound judgment to all who obey his commands. He is to be praised forever."

Then, in our reading from Ephesians, there is a command for Christians to choose to live as wise people. And Paul gives a series of directions on the practicalities on how this might be achieved—including doing good, thinking carefully before you act, being sober and clear headed, and praising God. There is much in these passages to ponder, but I want to focus on a couple of the important principles about wisdom that are delineated.

Foremost, that wisdom is a gift from God that God delights to give to God's people.

Secondly, wisdom seeks justice. It helps discern the right way forward out of difficulties and injustice. This is shown in the story that follows on from the lectionary reading in 1 Kings 3. Two rather disreputable women come before King Solomon to settle a dispute. Both women had given birth to sons, but one baby has died, and both insist that the living child is theirs.

Solomon's solution seems drastic. He orders a servant to cut the child in two. One of the women pleads for the life of the child, saying spare the child and give it to the other woman. Whereas, the other woman is willing to let the child be killed. Solomon, in his wisdom, discerns that the real mother spoke out of love for her son, seeking his life even at the cost of losing him. In her love, justice lay, and Solomon restored the child to her.

Not all problems are easily resolved even when there is much wisdom. But as that story reminds us, love, along with justice, are two of the underlying principles of wisdom. For wisdom seeks to fulfil the gospel call to love God and love neighbour. But it might well need to be the kind of love that is prepared to make tough decisions and to stick it out for the long run. Wisdom is not necessarily widely accepted, nor can it be assessed by opinion polls or popularity votes. History shows us that.

Remember how Florence Nightingale strove to reduce the appallingly high death rates in the military hospital at Scutari during the Crimean War. She advocated for good hygiene, attention to sanitation, improved diet and nursing care. She was often ridiculed and rejected, but eventually her reforms were adopted and death rates fell.

In this time of COVID, we should be praying for wisdom for our leaders. They have many difficult, sometimes unpopular, decisions to make. Pray that they may be guided to make good and wise decisions. And remembering the words of Seneca, that “No (one) was ever wise by chance,” pray also, that we may be wise and loving as we, too, face tough times. Pray that we may not turn inwards, but rather pray that we may act with wisdom and love. Amen.
