Our God is gracious and kind. When we sincerely admit our wrong, we are offered restoration and wholeness. For this, we say, with humble gratitude,



Reflecting

Rev. Deacon Wendy Elson

I have never been a lawn bowler, because I tried it and I am hopeless. But I do understand what happens to those little round balls as they roll on down those pretty greens. They take off to the edges. They have a bias! Just like those little balls, I believe the Bible shows a bias. God loves the poor. God is on the side of the poor and calls us into those places to minister in a different way. A bit like those balls roll off to the edges, that is where we are called to be.

Sometimes we need to be confronted by those we ignore, those who are usually just outside our vision. My understanding of the Gospel message, a theme throughout the Bible (as we see in every lectionary reading today) is that the mission of God is right there. It isn't just the poor in the sense of money either, but of all those sidelined by society (and sadly sometimes by the church). Those who need our solidarity and our advocacy, our standing with them for justice and righteousness. After all, sometimes the sidelined are us! And sometimes we are the privileged who benefit from the sidelining of others.

In the first story in Mark today this woman who is marginalised by gender, race, class and being the mother of a child who was disabled (indeed, held in the clutches of 'evil') is calling for help and healing of so much pain.

I wonder who you would identify with in the story. Are you the disciples who are about to get a lesson in true discipleship? This marginalised woman who they would turn away seems to recognise the real Jesus and is commended for her great faith.


Might you be Jesus who has had a tough time of it lately and is suddenly interrupted in the very focused nature of his mission. People have a habit of doing that, but it is amazing how often the mission is found right there. I think Jesus gets a lesson in discipleship himself in this narrative and he shows the importance of openness to hearing God in the 'other'.

Perhaps you are the woman herself (known as Justa by tradition) and feel that people are not really listening. You are sick of the suffering and are wailing in lament to the Holy One, longing for attention and to be heard.

Or perhaps you are her daughter, known as Berenice. Who is there to speak for you?

Maybe you are the narrator, witness to the story, yet a step removed. Or maybe you are the Jewish rulers who Jesus has called out for their lack of true discipleship.

The healing narratives are problematic for some. The deaf are sometimes more able to 'hear' than those whose ears function fully. Those we call 'disabled' sometimes struggle with the view of disability as impairment and a lack of whatever 'normal' is. We are all abled and disabled in different ways and there is no real normal. All of us call for healing and wholeness and deeper faith. All of us need each other to truly thrive and flourish. The gospel calls us to bring good news, to truly hear one another and to stand in the edges with those who find their place there. In this we all find healing and wholeness; in this we express our faith.











Responding: Prayers for the World and Community

The Prayers of the People today makes use of an important Uniting Church document, a renewal of our 1977 Statement to the Nation. These points are what we ask for in building a just and compassionate Australia in "Our Vision for a Just Australia". https://uniting.church/visionstatement/

- 1. Constitutional change to enshrine a First Nations Voice to Federal Parliament. We pray this day for healing and wholeness as we seek justice with the First Peoples. May we stand for truth as we listen and learn.
- 2. Recognise the sovereignty of First Nations and establish a commission for treaty making, truth telling, justice and reconciliation.

May we give space for hearing and healing and true relationship. We long for wholeness.

- 3. A national climate policy and plan for a just, equitable and rapid transition to a low-carbon economy, that drives down greenhouse gas pollution. Creation groans and needs our advocacy. We hear its wailing in deepest suffering. May we take responsibility to stand for our world against greed and profit that robs us all.
- **4. Policies which support people, nations and ecosystems that are most vulnerable to climate change.** We pray for those most affected and we long for creative solutions which bring healing.

- **5.** An end to the policy of indefinite, mandatory detention for people seeking asylum. May we treat others the way we would like to be treated. May we look into the eyes of others and see the Christ.
- 6. A system that supports people seeking asylum to live in the Australian community with access to essential services while their refugee status is processed in a timely manner. The least and the lost, you call us to care and compassion.
- 7. A fairer tax system including the introduction of laws which target tax evasion and avoidance. The gap between rich and poor widens, help us to seek justice.
- **8. Access to decent and affordable housing.**All of us need a home, shelter, a belonging place.
 Bring justice, sheltering God.
- 9. Raising, and appropriately indexing, the single rate of Jobseeker, Youth Allowance and Parenting Payments, and related payments including rental assistance. Worth and dignity, a basic wage and a sense of meaning. We pray for wholeness and for all to thrive.
- 10. Universal access to quality early learning for all children aged three and four, prior to their commencing school. Our young ones need this basic right, wherever they live and whatever their circumstance. We stand with them loving God.

11. Older people have access to appropriate, quality, well-funded services that meet their needs in the location they choose. Our elders need our love and respect. Teach us to truly value their wisdom and dignity.

12. A comprehensive approach to preventing gender-based violence and domestic and family violence with targeted strategies for those most at risk. We stand with those who are vulnerable and at risk. Our hearts call out for action to protect those who need it.

13. Adequate funding of appropriate services for people living with mental illness.

We advocate for those who are struggle with their pain. Help us to advocate for greater support.

14. An NDIS that is fully funded and properly rolled-out where no one is left behind in the process. Our vulnerable ones need adequate and generous care. For the least of these...

15. A scaled up Australian aid program.

This day we also hold others across our world who wail their pain, those in Afghanistan and other conflict zones. Those who struggle with illness, those who long for healing and those who are victims of natural disasters.

16. Australian Government in partnership with global institutions, Australian NGOs and our regional neighbours, address the worst impacts of COVID-19 on the world's most vulnerable nations and communities. You teach us to stand with all who are vulnerable, to call for health and wholeness and healing. We long for healing, O God. Stand with us as we stand together in seeking justice. Your kingdom come on earth, we pray.
