Becoming Least

I am always encouraged by readings where the disciples show their humanity. It encourages me to carry on. The disciples find the teaching that Jesus is offering hard, this learning is outside their usual life experience. They have status in the community because they are the disciples of a famous teacher, they follow him, see miracles, are respected within the group of Jesus followers. But in today's reading from Mark, they are asked to be like children.

We must understand something of the status of children in their culture. In our society, children are valued, they are welcomed into a family and seen as precious. In Jesus' time, children were non-entities, they were unimportant, the least in the society and Jesus is asking the disciples to be like this. A friend of mine, a minister, worked with another cultural group that used his church. He worried about the children and spoke to the leaders about how they ran about unsupervised during services and the church was on a busy road. The leaders laughed and told him that Australians just didn't have enough children, Australians worry too much. They loved their children but, in their number, there was not the same focus on their welfare. These people would have understood this teaching and what it was asking.

Jesus was asking the disciples to be the servant of all, to be the ones who always put others before themselves. Jesus is making a reversal of status and values in the kingdom. Jesus tells the disciples that he will be killed but this introduces a way of non-violence in the community of his followers. We, too must, as followers of Jesus follow this way. This means paying attention to social power and privilege, choosing the Way of the Cross in all our interactions.

The disciples know that their dispute about who was the greatest was not acceptable, they show this in their unwillingness to tell Jesus what they were talking about. They're embarrassed. Jesus is teaching them about the Way of the Cross, that he must die and they are worried about who is the greatest. Jesus tells them they must be servants; Jesus is challenging hierarchy as they are trying to build it, in their little community.

I think we can all understand them and feel for them. When we are challenged, it is easy to fall into the trap of thinking about things as they are, not the big picture. Imagine how you would feel if your leader said he must be killed. I'd be scared, unsettled, by the loss of a guide and mentor as well as what it might mean for me. Maybe the disciples were thinking, who's going to take over? They didn't understand. This is tough stuff, and we still find it challenging. As disciples we don't tell people what to do, we serve them, we become the least. The way we treat the youngest and most vulnerable is a good measure of our discipleship.

We must welcome those on the edges of society, the unlovely, the different, the poor, homeless, whoever turns up because when we welcome them, we welcome Jesus himself.
