

## Reflecting

### Saltiness

Last week, we became the least, today we become salt. I find it fascinating how when we read two of the lectionary readings together, we find a gem, something to remember and hold on to. In our servanthood, however small the part we play, we are salt. Salt, which is needed in such tiny amounts, the least of the ingredients but so important. I've never thought about it before, but it fits together. The work of salt in the food is unseen but we notice if it isn't there. Curry for instance can be almost tasteless, however much spice you use, if you don't add a little salt.

Salt in Bible times was essential and valuable, not only as flavouring but also as a preservative and purifier. We are the preservers of the body of Christ and as we read the whole reading, also the purifiers. If salt is left too long it can lose its flavour and not be as useful. We must keep the salt alive in ourselves, the work in our community to use our gifts and serve those around us in any way we can, keeping God's work going and the light of Christ in the work. I believe the salt can be the quality of our discipleship and this is how this saying relates to the rest of the passage which can be confronting.

Is Christ really telling us to amputate bits of body? It is important to note that none of the body parts mentioned are essential and in an agrarian community that worked with tools, there would have been accidents so many of his listeners may have been aware of individuals missing fingers and toes, even eyes, if not hands and feet. The metaphor could be used in our community. If we as the church are the body of Christ are there parts of the church that could be causing us to stumble? Programs that are no longer filling their purpose and draining workers from other activities, even buildings that are no longer used or fit for purpose? We are called to let go of these for the good of the body, grieving and accepting the pain that may be involved.

In the first few verses, Jesus affirms that good can come from outside before saying to incise the “bad”. “Whoever is not against us is for us.” (Mark 9:40) Perhaps cooperation with other nearby churches or denominations and organisations is in order, so that we share the load and don’t duplicate services. We could then be salt in those wider communities too.

Jesus, using this analogy of salt reminds of the essential nature of our work in the community and caring for others. Salt cannot be left out and our faith and work as a disciple cannot be left out of our lives, it is what makes the body of Christ seen in the world. Salt is an everyday commodity in many foods and so our work for each other is an everyday thing, not just in crises. In our present COVID pandemic it is the phone call, the smile, the encouragement to a neighbour that becomes their salt, what makes their day tastier, and worth living.

I end with verse 50 and the reminder: “Have salt in yourselves and be at peace with one another”.

## **Responding: Prayers for the World and Community**

Creator God, we bring before you a world that groans through profound stresses and challenges. Through these stresses and challenges, help us be salt, and be at peace with one another.

While we celebrate the barred bandicoot’s move towards a strong recovery in our grassy plains, we know that too many species have already reached extinction due to human behaviour. We pray for leaders, policy-makers, and environmental experts that together we attend to the needs of creation. We pray for those who offer sanctuary to wildlife, for those in landcare groups, and for those working to improve the health of waterways. We pray for the many small voices, that they may encourage and equip others to act for the sake of your good creation.

This is the time of year where we begin to prepare for another summer fire season, and so we are reminded of the changing climate of the earth and the need to take rapid action for the sake of flora and fauna and even the future of humanity. We pray for leaders preparing for another summit about global actions to mitigate against a warming planet. May there be grace, wisdom and a shared vision for a sustainable future.

We pray as we have prayed often in the last 18 months for those impacted by COVID 19. We recognise that we are tired - of fear, of restrictions, of complying with changing rules, of isolation, of loneliness, of masks, of being denied simple pleasures. We pray for those who face deeper troubles than being tired - those who grieve alone, those who struggle with poor mental health, those impacted greatly due to vulnerabilities to the virus, those who struggle to make ends meet, those unable to be vaccinated and those conflicted about them.

We pray for our country, fractured as states and territories take different paths and fight different battles with the federal government.
