Reflecting

God gives us a future...

"Not one stone of these great buildings will be left upon another, all will be thrown down." As I read these words, I remember travelling home after a cyclone. This one in one-hundred-year event had done incredible damage to homes and infrastructure. I was amazed as we drove past huge blocks of concrete from bridges thrown around-these were big wide span bridges built on broad pillars. To cross the river meant a long detour. It was awe inspiring, the power of the wind and rain in this natural phenomenon.

I always think about this when I read these passages of scripture. Structures that people build will not last for ever. As we watch on TV the houses that lost walls and roofs in the recent storms. As we look around us now, we cannot deny this, the world that we have built seems to be disintegrating. Our hospitals, our welfare systems, even our moral and ethical beliefs seem to be failing and we see fear and uncertainty in the people around us. Many have nothing to hold onto in their lives.

On the night of the cyclone my first child was born, and this tiny baby was in the car as we returned home. For us a sign of hope and promise of future.

Today we read the passage from 1 Samuel, where Hannah prays for a child and her prayer is answered. Eli thinks she is drunk, so intense is her prayer, her lips move but he cannot hear her words. Eli sees her faith and gives her a word from God; her prayer will be answered. For Hannah there is a future.

This is the basis of our faith-there is always a future. Jesus the Messiah comes at a time of great hardship for the Jewish people, living under Roman rule. The Roman empire believed that peace came from a strong army and people ruled by force. We see these same beliefs today. The strongest countries have the best weapons. Jesus, the Messiah came and challenged these beliefs. God's kingdom is based, not on a magnificent temple that is destroyed, nor

on a strong army that is eventually defeated. Jesus comes as the servant king, the one who seeks those on the edges. Jesus and his followers make a difference with love.

In the gospel, we hear that God is about making new futures possible. What else do the miracle stories tell us? The good news is that Jesus is present in the disasters that the world shows us, in our experience and the media. To many, Jesus' presence seems a fiction. But for those of us who walk daily in relationship with God, we know differently and we are called to step out each day and make the difference.

In the last few verses of the Mark passage, Jesus warns the disciples that many will try to lead people astray. Their job is to hold fast to the gospel despite what happens around them. Hang on, don't worry too much about all the threats, look after your neighbour, show love, care for the world and people in it and God will have a future for us.











Prayers for the World and Community

Loving God, you have put your laws in our hearts and written them on our minds. We pray, this day, that more and more people may come to know you and to act in your ways. In a world where violence, destruction and enmity control so many, we pray for your grace to be seen increasingly.

Some days our world seems in pieces, rocks thrown down, natural and manmade disasters.

In our world, where there are so many competing voices and divergent demands amidst pressing needs, we pray for people to show courage and to seek out whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable.

With the effects of the COVID19 pandemic going on and on, people stressed and overworked, locked down and isolated, missing friends and family, not sure what tomorrow, next week or next year will look like.

We trust you to put things together

Our own lives sometimes seem so muddled. We keep going day by day, in happiness and grief, in joy and anger, in disappointment and hope. We ask your care and love in the deepest prayers of our hearts as we pray together in the words that Jesus taught us:

The Lord's Prayer

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come, your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins,
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
