Reflection: God's House Rules

So let's renovate...no wait, the time for that is over...let's build a new spiritual house. What is our foundation? The stone that was rejected is now the feature stone. We will build around it. You take the seating areas and I will take the living areas. Look around, what do we need? There is space for all...but who does that include? This building comes at a cost and there is no security in it. There is risk of pain and suffering. Will we continue?

I am your neighbour. I had a job but have lost it now because the café closed down. I am sad because I had an income...but I also loved to meet the people. Some I served just once but others were regulars and I really care about them, you know. I am lonely...can I come in?

I am emotionally unstable. Am I welcome?

I am a single mum and mostly I cope OK. My children are noisy and sometimes hard work. One of them has a social disability and people frown at me. My little one needs extra care but I can't really provide that. I am so tired and stressed because I don't have much support. I am feeling the pressure and couldn't pay my rent this week. Can I come in?

I am really just a browser. I am in my teens and, while I am interested in your faith, I wonder how you can profess to follow Jesus and yet you spend your money on maintaining your organisations, not feeding the poor. I wonder what your faith has to say about all the things that happen in the world. Do you have the courage to suffer for your faith? If I want to see this 'Father', can I see God through you? Will you reveal the nature of God to me?


I am lonely and scared. I have lots of problems with my mental health. I can't tell you my name because I am afraid. If I reach out to your house of faith will you let me in? I don't think like you. I don't behave like you, or understand your rules. I am one of the rejected ones...will you build your house with me as a focus? I wonder if you will think I must have done something wrong to be in this position.

I am an addict. I don't want to tell you my story because I don't know who to trust. I have made some choices that you may see as bad. Will you be a safe space and shelter me in this spiritual home?

Is there room for me if I don't know Jesus or accept him as the Way or the Door into your spiritual house? There are many rooms...are you building a room for me?

These are our living stones. They are our holy priesthood. Once we were not a people. BUT now we are God's people. It is these rejected ones who will be our cornerstones, pivotal in our building. Perhaps THEY will welcome US in.

Jesus, we long to follow you. Into Your Hands we commit our spirits. Give us courage and strength. Make us brave and loving.
