Reflection:

Do you remember the Picture Bible that was around a few years ago? Alright, I mean about 50 years ago. It was very helpful in making the Bible alive to children. I do, however, think that it gave me some false images as well, which have needed to be examined later in life.

The Exodus reading is a bit unexpected to me. The image it creates is not like my child picture Bible. Yes, it does say that God caused the wheels of the Egyptian chariots to be sluggish. My pictures did show them stuck on the rocky bottom of the sea. But no, they didn't just plough on into the sea in their chase of the Israelites. Actually, they all camped the night at the seaside first and the Israelites were protected by something amazing. The angel and the cloud which guided them through the day by taking the lead, went around to flank them during the night and to keep them safe. It even gave them light. What assurance and what protection was lovingly offered to the people in such a fearful and risky time!

Then in the Gospel we see the importance and nature of forgiveness. Of sharing grace time upon time, no matter what the offence. Just as we have been given grace, so also we give grace to others. It cannot be hoarded.

I will try not to get caught up in the debate in the Romans reading regarding vegetarianism and weakness. How ironic that this reflection falls to me as the team vegetarian. So, I am not going to go there as judgements are out of place in the debate!

We are told here in Romans that judging is not ours to do. 'Who are you to judge?' Judgement is an arrogance and it is a hindrance to those we judge, and to us when we act as judge.

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Reflection continues

I think that there is a fair bit of pressure on us these days to make judgements, to make assessments. Pressure even to make snap judgements which we then need to hold and reinforce. Perhaps, it's all those uncomfortable judging shows around cooking efforts, talents in dancing and singing etc. Like in this Romans passage, what we eat, even which day of the week people consider best, we judge it all. We think we have to have an opinion on all things. It is such a human thing to make a judgement and if we can possibly find the "other" to be inferior, then we can feel superior. It is so tempting and at a shallow level it can build our self esteem (although deep underneath we know, don't we?). And then comes the pressure inside us, to hold on to these views and judgements. Letting go of these preconceived ideas is then really tough. But how many times have YOU been forgiven? Hard to justify then, not doing the same for others. Just let go.

So, without that forgiveness the Matthew passage underlines, we are pretty out of step. We ignore the grace we have been given and hold it to ourselves. We can find so much to judge about and it can be the strongest, the dominant part, of our nature. Instead let the dominant part of our nature become compassion and grace. And perhaps gratitude has a part to play here.

We are all less than whole, we are all human, make mistakes, act like duds, whatever! But we are all forgiven and loved and cherished and celebrated. God is with us and forgives us. Jesus already showed deep love by being prepared to keep making the points of love, even when that threatened his life. And, well, you know the rest of that story. God has already forgiven us and shown us absolute love.

Throughout the tough restrictions there have been reminders to be thankful and to make gratitude a practice. I recently found myself



holding a point of view I have held for years that I had to change. I needed to see things in a different light, to write myself a new narrative. I had told myself that there was no joy in a certain part of my life. So, I decided to reframe it and see it through a different lens. To do this I needed to change my self-talk that kept insisting that there was no joy. This part of me kept looking for the reasons to see it that way. And of course, that is what it found (since it was all it COULD see). It caused me to look at a couple of other things that I had flippantly described a certain way and which had then acted as reinforcement. Restrictions have been good for reflection!

So maybe these eyes of grace and compassion could even act on my own self-perception, allowing me to see myself as God does. OK, so this is a work in progress but if God has and does forgive me, why do I hold on to those things I see as regrettable. Why do I feel a little bit ill when I think about certain words and actions? The eyes of grace through which I see, need to be more like contact lenses than spectacles I take on and off.

As I said at the start, things are not always as we remember them to be, as we thought that they were. We are then invited to change our understandings and perceptions and take courage in the fact that we are surrounded by the Light and Grace of a very present God. For sure, God's grace is not to be sniffed at. The whole Egyptian army was chasing the fleeing people who must have wondered if they had lost their marbles by following Moses out into the desert. They must have really been at their wit's end with the suffering of being an oppressed and discounted people. They left everything behind and trusted God and Moses, and God gave them reassurance, courage and deep care through the protection and presence of the Light and the Cloud. God's nature, God's glory and grace, was right there. And is right here!

The Psalm tells us that we are to tremble at the presence of the Lord, present to us in and through the remembering of God's care and provision for us. We are to be transformed by this knowledge and experience.

So judging is out, and gratitude and mercy and grace are in. Let God take care of the rest. Treat others with tenderness. Be tender with yourself, for then you can tend others. Live gratitude and awe, for then you will recognise grace.

Our offering is received and blessed.


