"BABY CELEBRATIONS"

Lots of us like to sing at Christmas. Carols are a good way to celebrate – even if it is still through a mask! The Bible is full of times when people sing to God. On the beach of the Red Sea, feet still wet, Miriam and

the women sang. In tormented nights in the palace, David sang the demons out of Saul. And throughout his life David sang praises and the promises of God.

But now, here at this point and only here, on this first Christmas night, the entire heavenly host sing to a few people, not just any people, but shepherds, who were not thinking about God at all, until the angels came. This singing marks a great celebration!

Luke wrote about an expectant travelling couple, caught out at the end of a journey they were forced to take by the occupying power. He wrote in understated terms about a stressed family away from home, about poor circumstances, the shed and the manger. The shepherds fit the tone too and then, surprise! There are angels singing and a heavenly proclamation. "Glory to God in the highest and on earth, peace, …"

It's attractive, the glory to God and the peace, but that's the hard part for us. 'And on earth, peace'. God may have this intent, the Christmas cards might proclaim it, even our genuine best wishes want this. But our world does its best to contradict it.

There's no room in the inn, the Romans are pushing people around, the security threat level is being raised, the news is full of tragedies and violence, as it ever was. And we have this message from the heavens, of peace.

Unwrapping is something of a familiar experience for most of us at Christmas. So perhaps a little unwrapping of this story. We learn the message is delivered by the 'angelos,' we translate it, 'angels', but it's just the Greek for messenger. They are said to come from God and tell of God's coming. 'Immanuel' is the message here, in a nutshell. It's Hebrew for "God with us." How is God with us? That's where we stop unwrapping and deal with mystery. God is "the high and lofty One who inhabits eternity," says the prophet Isaiah, and by and large, though they would use different language and symbols to express it, all the major faiths of the world would tend to agree. And yet in our story today, we meet 'God with us', laid in a manger.

This Jesus is the one who, from his arrival in a manger to his departure on a cross, redefines God for us. Here God is no longer distant and completely other, here God is small, vulnerable and personal. Here God is not totally transcendent, but is sleeping in straw, walking the streets and blessing the poor. This is how peace comes on earth. It arrives in person and helps us break down the walls between us, not calling us to take up a fight, not needing us to engage in conflict. This 'God with us' arrives to quell fear, to take on the risk, stands up to the threat of violence and takes the consequences.

So as we celebrate, remember this is a time for love and adoration, a time for embodied truth, lived with generous self-giving and extravagant love.

Here, in celebration we join in God's joy. Here we reflect God's love made flesh, made real in human action. And, as it was from the outset, it should always be a generous open sharing thing, because the birth of Christ and his peace was for all.

This is a message open to all who are less than perfect. The light of the world does shine in the darkest places, despite the walls, the temptation to hate the other and human policies of separation. In this joyful good news, we are all embraced by God.

And perhaps as we take a moment here to take in a little of the scope of Christmas meaning, something of the incredible wonder of this baby who is Godwith-us, something of the wonder of the season might be lit with a new spark for us.

And that might give us some inspiration to join in doing what we can for this peace to grow!

Olittle town of Bethlehem - verse 3


