Christ is risen!


He is risen indeed! Alleluia.

Reflecting

This Easter, Australians will spend an estimated \$1.7 billion on Easter related food including hot cross buns and Easter eggs. The economic value of Easter is such that manufacturers and bakers endlessly innovate to come up with exciting new variations (this year including sticky date hot cross buns, burger sauce hot cross buns and mango/passionfruit Easter eggs) to encourage us to buy more.

Easter, for many Australians, has become just another holiday with the bonus of some culinary indulgence. The meaning of Easter has been lost for these people, very often through ignorance or indifference as many Australians have had little or no religious education. Unlike previous generations, very few have been sent to Sunday School when they were children and only a minority have attended church on a regular basis. Many Australians do not even know the basic facts of the Easter story, let alone its life changing significance.

This to me is incredibly sad, as for me Easter is a commemoration of the pivotal moment in human history when God in love reached out to change everything.

Reflecting continues

That original Easter was a day of great mystery and power, unfathomable even to those who were part of it until the gracious light of God's presence began to help them see that the inexplicable really had happened, and that truly Jesus had been raised from the dead, and he was alive! When Mary Magdalene was greeted by Jesus a whole new world began to open up. A world in which death had been defeated.

For when Jesus was raised from the dead by God on Easter morning it was in order that they and we may know God's love and forgiveness, and be brought into a new relationship with God. And through this relationship be guided and strengthened by God's Holy Spirit in order that we might live lives worthy of the Gospel, and be granted eternal life in the presence of God.

In the resurrection, we have God's promise that life is stronger than death, that love is greater than hate, that mercy overcomes judgement, and that all the sufferings and difficulties of this life are transient -- real and palpable and sometimes painful, for sure, but they do not have the last word and do not represent the final reality. And overarching over it all is the immeasurable love of God for humanity.

This is really important for us not only to understand and hold onto not only for ourselves, but also to share with others especially those who are despairing in these difficult days.

The famous British Methodist minister W.E. Sangster contracted an incurable disease that caused progressive muscular atrophy. It was one of those dreadful illnesses where muscles waste away, where the voice fails, and swallowing gradually becomes impossible. Nevertheless, Sangster continued to throw himself into his work in British home missions until he could not go on. His legs became useless and his voice went completely, but he could still hold a pen shakily. On Easter morning, just a few weeks before he died, he wrote in a letter to his daughter: "It is terrible to wake

on Easter morning and have no voice with which to shout, "He is Risen!" – but it would be still more terrible to have a voice and not want to shout."

I pray that you are privileged to know that love, that forgiveness, that hope, and that transformation this Easter day; and that you are able to rejoice in the good news of Easter and cry with joy, "Christ is risen!"

But let us also think of all those we know who do not share this transformative knowledge and faith, and pledge to do all we can to share this good news with those for whom Easter is merely another holiday.

For we are called to share the good news of God's love and forgiveness offered through the risen Christ. For if we do this, hopefully next Easter those with whom we share this good news might know that transformative love of God in their lives, and join with us in proclaiming "Christ is Risen! **He is risen indeed!" Hallelujah!** Amen.
