Reflecting Rev. Jennie Gordon

According to the gospel writers, the disciples never fully understand Jesus' ministry and mission. Neither do we. This season of Epiphany is about God revealing God's self to us, through Jesus Christ. We are invited to draw closer in faith to the One who reaches for us in the baby at Bethlehem. It's a constant journey full of puzzle and paradox and so we wait with the disciples to find out what Jesus will reveal to us, each night and each morning.

In this week's reading from Mark, Jesus and the disciples have just left the synagogue where Jesus has rebuked and released an unclean spirit from someone. Word spreads quickly and here they are at Simon and Andrew's house, where Simon's motherin-law is laid low with a fever. It's interesting that this is the only reference to this unnamed woman, and strange that we never hear about Simon/Peter's wife, ever. This woman, and the women around her are used as props in the main story. I wonder what her story might have been. As Jesus took her by the hand and lifted her up, the fever left her, and she began to serve them. Was she simply lifted in order to serve obediently? Or was she so overcome with gratitude and blessing that she laid the table as an expression of the outpouring of the healing and abundant grace she had experienced in the touch of Jesus? I choose the latter. We will never know.

Word travelled fast, and as soon as the Sabbath had ended, at sundown, 'the whole city' was gathered around the door. Jesus went to work quietly, silencing the demons who knew him, as before. You can imagine the excitement of the disciples to see how quickly their teacher had become popular. So recently called away from their day jobs, they must have been overwhelmed with the pace and power of this prophet's rise to prominence. Of course, he will keep doing this until everyone is healed and whole. Success builds success. But from curing crowds around the door, to creeping out on that same night alone to pray, Jesus has another plan.

Reflecting continues

When we look for Jesus in those populated places of 'fame and fortune', we find that he has already left, and is on his way somewhere else to proclaim the message. When we think we have caught up with him, we find that he has already moved on. Jesus continues to put distance between our obsession with power, certainty and success, and his mission in the world.

Jesus remains apart, alone in prayer. In Isaiah 40:31 we read, 'those that wait for the LORD shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.' Jesus knows the Scriptures. He finds a waiting place, a praying space, a lacuna where he can be renewed and restored. He is hunted down by eager disciples, 'Everyone is searching for you'. Yes. we are.

I sense a hunger in our world right now for deep connection with the Holy Other, for making meaning in the world's meaningless soup of abusive power, greed, destruction, warfare, hatred, racism... the list goes on. We've been impacted by so many physical, social, emotional and spiritual wounds through recent years and Covid, that it's hard to remember what life was like before. There's a sense that more than ever, people are searching for meaning. Maybe they are looking for Jesus, the one acquainted with the powers of darkness, the revelation of God, Divine Mystery. They may or may not be looking in the places that they might have looked before. I wonder what this means for the church.

As followers of Jesus, we pause, and pray to be renewed so we can rise up and serve. We serve with kindness, gratitude and blessing, because the world needs that, and because Jesus taught us how to do it, and yes, he's already ahead of us, waiting for us to follow.

May it be so, Amen.
