
So here it is.

It's quite extraordinary. Jesus himself stood among them and just about frightened the living daylights out of them. Then the apparent ghost directs attention to his wounds – wounds of the flesh, wounds inflicted by the tyrannical power of Rome, wounds of crucifixion, symbols of death and the reality of all they had just experienced.

It's too much.

When we cannot piece together what we see or hear or believe, it's called cognitive dissonance. When it's too much sometimes we see ghosts - ghosts that haunt, and ghosts bringing hope. We see wounds and scars, and see and believe, and disbelieve, and cannot see - all at once.

Jesus shows the disciples his hands and his feet and, in their joy, they are disbelieving.



Ghosts don't eat, well that's the common wisdom, if there can be wisdom about such things. Jesus seeks food and in the most concrete of encounters eats in their presence. Is this meant to calm our fears, is it meant to guell our longings, is it meant to satisfy our questions? Or does it just add to the dissonance, the joy in disbelief?

Jesus stands among them and offers peace. 'Peace be with you.'

Isn't that what we need when we see ghosts. when we are startled and terrified, when we are disbelieving and need some joy in the struggle of all that life throws at us? 'Peace be with you', says Jesus.

Even though it's too much, we see movement in this brief encounter. Peace may well be changing them. So too the wounds the scarred-risen-one bears. But it also leaves more questions that don't seem to take us anywhere. How does a ghost have flesh and bones? How can one that materialises like a ghost, eat as though they are human? How can this be held alongside the many other mysterious resurrection encounters which are more spirit than flesh? How can flesh and bone be enough to help us into the new vision of resurrection?

Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures.

Those questions that go nowhere can trap and trouble our disbelieving minds. Does it matter if this one who comes is flesh or spirit, ghost or fish eater? Or is it more that Jesus comes offering peace, and opens our minds to the scriptures, and invites us to witness these things more than our dead-end questions?

Just two weeks ago we journeyed through Holy Week. We heard the story of Jesus' suffering. On a day labelled 'Good' we heard that Jesus breathed his last breath as he was crucified. We held the sacred silence of the Sabbath and heard the surprise of the women who came to an empty tomb on the morning of that third day. 'Thus it is written' of him. The Messiah is to suffer and rise from the dead on the third day.

There is another key point that Jesus makes here. It is for repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, for all nations.

Perhaps the early hearers of Luke's gospel needed reassurance that it hadn't all gone horribly wrong. The power of Rome to crucify and publicly humiliate must have left lingering doubts. If your leader is dead and you fear it's all over, you might at best be embarrassed, but perhaps you could be locked away with the ghosts in your head - fears and nightmares of all that had happened.

Does the appearance of our fish-eating Jesus quell that anxiety? Do we need an injection of hope to move beyond the stultifying powers of the empire and find ourselves witness to new hope in the name of the risen Christ?

Soon we hear of a new chapter of the fledgling church. The Holy Spirit comes to empower apostles as witnesses to all God has done. Breathe on us, breath of God. Breathe on us with your peace, move us with your Spirit – until your risen presence lifts us as witnesses to love, liberation and life in your name.
