



Unit W5: Preparing and Leading Worship



In the following chapters, the term "worship leader" is recognised to mean different roles in different churches. In some churches, it means those who lead the worshipping community through a designated time of worship and praise singing at some given point in the service (often at the beginning). In other churches, it means someone or a group of people who lead the worshipping community through the entire service (often minus the preaching and Eucharist). In other churches, it can mean a role somewhere between these two groups. Whatever this role may be, the following guidelines, cautions, and tips for ethics, dealing appropriately with emotion, and communicating effectively would apply.

In all cases, the aim of the worship leader is to direct people's focus towards God - not towards themselves.

Guidance on behaviour of those who lead worship:



Whilst not all who study these Units on Exploring Worship are preparing for accreditation as Lay Preachers, the Assembly of the Uniting Church in Australia has provided valuable guidance for those who experience a call from God and the church to lead worship.

The responsibilities involved in preaching and worship leadership call for the highest ethical behaviour by those involved. They parallel similar ethical requirements for ordained Ministers of the Word.
